### Vaughan Sells 2 Lots \$38,254

Two lots on Riverside Boulevard, Thornhill were sold Monday by the Town of Vaughan at a total price of \$38,254. Purchaser was Gavro Construction Limited, 24 Denrock Drive, Willowdale. The only other tender was at \$17,750 per lot. Appraised value of each lot was \$20,000.

Both lots are located on the west side of Riverside Boulevard, one approximately 435 feet north of Uplands Avenue and the other approximately 515 feet north. Each has a frontage of 72 feet and a depth of approximately 140 feet and contains 10,000 square feet, more or less. They are zoned R1 for single family residences and will require a septic tank and tile system. Town water is available. The road is payed and curbed with storm

R. MANNING, Weed Inspector for the said Borough, to cause said noxious weeds or weed seeds to be destroyed in such manner as he may deem proper, and that the expenses incurred by the said Weed Inspector in the discharge of his duties shall be placed on the Collector's Roll of the Municipality against the respective parcels concerned and that such amounts shall be collected in the same manner as taxes under the Assessment Act.
