Family Camping Commences This Weekend In Albion Hills Area

For those people who have been eagerly awaiting the chance to start spending their weekends "under canvas," the beginning of family camping this weekend at the Albion Hills Conservation Area of the Metro Conservation Authority will come as good news.

Albion Hills is located five miles north of Bolton on Highway 50, and the weekend camping program runs until September 6.

Camping at Albion Hills is on a permit basis only, with accommodation available for 50 units, either tents or trailers. Permits may be obtained by contacting the authority at 5 Shoreham Drive, Downsview. There is a charge of \$5 per site per weekend.

Campers can enter the grounds up to 8:30 pm Friday, or anytime Saturday, and must leave before sundown Sunday.

The weekend program scheduled for Albion Hills campers consists of a Friday night bonfire, a forest and wildlife hike on Saturday morning, movies that evening, an early morning hike Sunday and a tour of the nearby authority farm.

Although there are no hydro, water or sewage hookups available in the area, there are such amenities as picnic tables, fire-

wood, barbecues, outdoor toilets, drinking water and garbage receptacles.

If camping doesn't excite you, there are many other activities taking place at the 14 conservation areas of the authority; the following are some of the highlights:

BRUCE'S MILL — Tours of the historic Bruce's Mill in the conservation area of the same name will take place Sunday and continue until October 3.

SATURDAY — 2 pm and 3:30 pm — Albion Hills, Boyd, Bruce's Mill.

SUNDAY — 2 pm and 3:30 pm — Albion Hills, Glen Haffy, Boyd, Bruce's Mill, 2 pm — Greenwood, 4 pm — Claremont.

Hikes are also conducted at Cold Creek Conservation Area at various times from now until October 31. For more information on these and other activities at the conservation authority's areas, call 630-9780.
