Hashish Traffic Charge Trial Is Switched From Here To Toronto

Two youths facing hashish traffic charge had their trials switched last week from Richmond Hill Provincial Court to Court 31 in old City Hall, Toronto.

They were arrested January 5 in Metro. Philip Queen of 182 Romac Court, Richmond Hill, is free on bail of \$200 cash with one surety.

Christopher Blackstock of 149 Lyon Avenue, Toronto, is free on \$500 cash bail with one surety.

The charge is possession of hashish for the purpose of trafficking.

They are due to appear in Court 31 on June 3.

Intending to wait for a ride is no excuse in court when you face an impairment charge after being caught asleep in your car with the ignition key in your hand.

So found James Watson, 39, of 13 Ellerby Square North, Woodbridge, when he appeared in Richmond Hill Provincial Court on Thursday of last week.

He was arrested for impaired care and control at 3:10 am April 2 on Pine Street, about 200 feet from the Woodbridge Hotel, York Regional Police Constables Bill Craddock and James McKeegan testified.

Watson said he went to sleep while waiting for a ride. His testimony was backed up by a friend, who said he hadn't been able to find Watson to take him home.

Provincial Judge Robert Taylor decided that Watson's intentions didn't free him from responsibility for being in the driver's seat with keys in hand while impaired.

The fine was \$100 and costs or 10 days. Conviction meant a three-month suspension of driving rights for Watson, who drives for a living.

The Crown Attorney withdrew another charge Watson faced, that of refusing to take a breathalyzer test.
