**BRADFORD:** A 25-year, \$400,000 mortgage on the Bradford Co-operative Storage building was burned recently to the cheers of 150 members. Built for \$750,000 with federal and provincial aid, the building serves the largest single market garden area in Canada.

**AURORA:** Council has authorized purchase of a new tank truck for the fire department. The new truck will be purchased from Lawton Brothers at a cost of about \$6,096. The 1,200-gallon tank to be mounted on it will come from Mobile Tank Industries of Agincourt at a cost of \$3,975. ## Obituary

### 92-Year-Old Robert E. Annable Wrote World Leaders As Hobby

Robert Edward Annable, who was in his 92nd year, passed peacefully away at York Central Hospital May 29. He had made his home for some years with his daughter, Mrs. Vega Bartlett, RR 2 Maple.

A carpenter and cabinet-maker, Mr. Annable worked on the construction of the former jail farm at Langstaff, Haverhill College, Loretto Abbey and the present building of the Toronto Star.

He came to this area from his native England in 1905 and began work in Richmond Hill with John Innis as his employer. During those years, the late Herbert Leach of Richmond Hill, who died only last year, was his best friend.

In 1916 he and his family moved to a farm in an area near what is now Avenue Road south

of Highway 401. They lived in a tent until they could build their own home, which still stands on Kelso Street.

Mr. Annable had an interesting hobby. Writing letters to world leaders, offering them advice. Many, including Dwight Eisenhower and John Diefenbaker, replied, and these replies were treasured.

He was predeceased by his wife in 1948, but leaves to mourn his passing a son Henry; four daughters, Mrs. Bartlett, Mrs. Adin Ward, Mrs. Rede Matlock and Mrs. Ruth Taylor; 21 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

Service was held at the Marshall Funeral Home with Rev. Clarence Bass of Stouffville Baptist Church officiating. Interment followed in Richmond Hill Cemetery.
