Tournament Newmarket

The place to be this weekend if you're a fast-ball fan just has to be Newmarket where the sixth annual Ontario Amateur Softball Association elimination tournament will be swinging into action Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Looking for their second win in four years of competing in this tournament will be the Richmond Hill Dynes Jewellers and interpid "Casey" Criggs. Russell

Cripps has had a hungry glint in his eye ever since the Jewellers staved the local citizenry by coming up with a tremendous effort to win it all in their first try way, back in 1968. That's one season I'll never forget but more on that a few paragraphs from now.

The winner of the 1971 tournament will represent Ontario in the C.A.S.A. Championships to be held in Halifax on Labor Day Weekend.

The Jewellers will be taking to the field against Welland Friday night at 9 p.m. in the first game of the double-knockout tournament which will see some 16 teams participating. All the games will be of seven inning duration except for the final three games of the tournament which will be nine innings. Other participating teams include Oshawa Tony's, Burlington, Niagara Falls, London (which won it last year), St. Catharines, Sault Ste. Marie, and, of course, Newmarket Ray's Gulf.

REMEMBER 1968?

But back to 1968 when Dynes' hurler Bob Domik came up with what was probably his best moments in his sojourn in a Jeweller uniform.

The Jewellers arrived in Windsor in the midst of a slump having lost their last two games in inept fashion to teams in the Toronto Beaches League. They arrived for the big weekend tournament with but one pitcher in tow, that being, of course, Mr. Domik.

More than one fan was heard to mutter that "they must be nuts coming to a tournament like this with only one chucker."

Domik came on to win five of the six games the Jewellers participated in including three games on that final, blistering hot day. He gave up but four runs, had four shutouts, gave up only 22 hits in 42 innings, and struck out a total of 53 batsmen. He also drove in the winning run that allowed the Jewellers to win it all.

Ironically, the Jewellers went on to play in the All Canadian in St. Catharines with Domik being forced into the background by a 19-year-old Oshawa lefty by the name of Pete Landers.

Landers was picked up for the tournament by the Jewellers, pitched brilliantly, but in a losing cause as St. Catharines went on to take it. Just one of those things.

But on that Sunday in Windsor it was all Bob Domik. Something to see.

How many players are still on the team from that Windsor series? Well, of course, there's still Domik and he's still a pitcher to contend with at all

Peeewe Lions Wallop Markham

Richmond Hill Peeewe Lions reeled off their sixth win in a row and their seventh in eight starts this season in the York Ontario Simcoe Peeewe League by trouncing Markham 14-1 June 28.

Winning pitcher was Glen Moreland who tossed a one-hitter.

It was strictly a case of too much Moreland as he set down 15 batters in a row before walking the lead off batter in the sixth inning who eventually scored Markham's lone run.

Moreland managed to get the first two batters in the bottom half of the seventh inning aided by a back hand stab of a liner to second base by Dale Strang. But the next batter slashed a ground ball just out of Strang's reach for their only hit of the game. The final batter grounded out to first base.

Moreland chalked up 10 strikeouts and faced only 23 batters, two above the minimum of 21 for a seven inning game.

One of the other features of this game was the two runs batted in by third baseman Doug Reid. Although going hitless, he drove a long fly ball to deep centrefield on which the fielder left while making the catch. Bob Putnam, who was on third, scored on the play as well as Mike Gallagher who

Baker's Sales and Service Squirts failed for the third straight time to win the second game of a tournament over the weekend.

They defeated Galt 10-3 in the first game at a tournament in Cobourg Dominion Day behind the sparkling eight hit pitching of Lorne Davidson but were manhandled 10-4 by Springbrook. On Friday night Baker's shut out the peppery Squirt team from Oak Ridges 5-0 as Davidson won his second game in two days tossing a one hitter.

Baker's scored eight runs while striking out 11 batters as they sent 13 batters to the plate. Steve Madden walked, Dennis Kane reached first on an error, Chris Nye and Pete Tipold singled, Craig Stoness walked, Phil Wood, Greg MacMillan, Madden, Kane and Nye all singled to put the game out of reach of Galt.

Davidson pitched a steady game, striking out six, walking two as he scattered eight hits. Querengesser knocked in two runs while MacMillan, Kane, Davidson, Nye, Wood and Tipold all earned one run batted in. Tipold and Madden scored twice, and Wood, Nye, Davidson, Kane, Stoness and MacMillan each plated one run.

While the boys played and fielded like winners in the first game, the reverse was true in their second as they were trounced by Springbrook. The Hill boys were simply "psyched" by the bigger Springbrook team as well as their fans. Baker's were visibly nervous and booted the ball around. 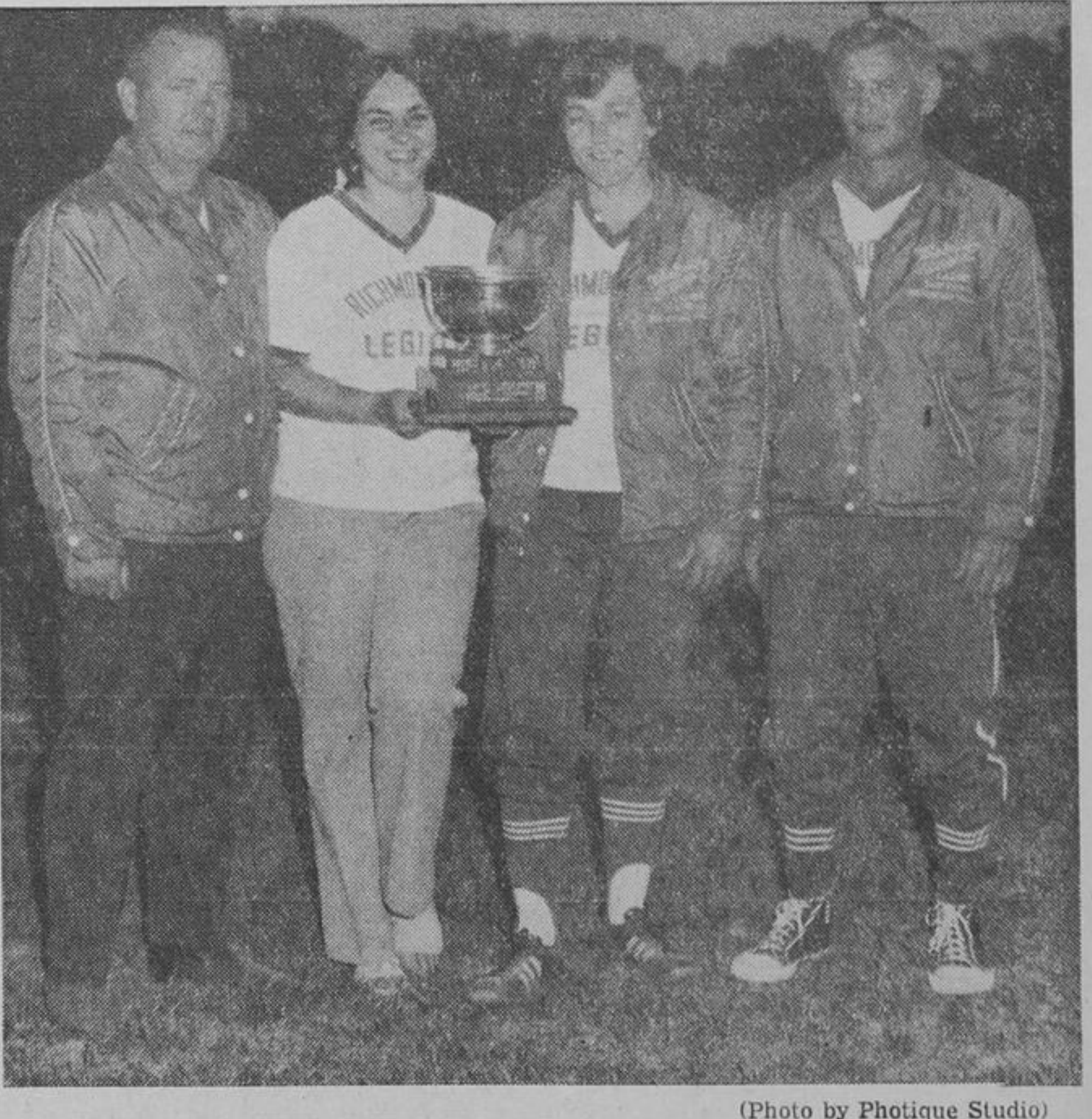
July 3 at Allandale a Richmond Hill rink composed of Brian Mather, Jessie and Jim Grainger won the mixed trebles tournament.
