Steeles And Bayview

Opposed By Ratepayers OMB Passes High-Rise

In approving a high-rise apartment development at the southeast corner of Steeles and Bayview Avenues, Municipal Board Chairman Aloysius Kennedy warned lawyers and real estate agents to be more helpful in informing potential purchasers about zoning and development proposals.

At a hearing of the OMB on May 30 ratepayers from North York and Markham protested the proposed development, stating that enquiries had been made before they had purchased their high price single family homes, and they were assured by employees of North York planning department that the zoning in the area was for single family houses.

It was brought to light, however, that a number of applications for rezoning had come to the borough's planning board, and that others were pending. Rezoning was considered as

early as 1963, but purchasers in 1968 and 1970 were not told that high density development was being considered.

The OMB decision approves a modification of the original plan for a 17 acre site bordering on a ravine land adjacent to the east branch of the Don River.

Spokesmen for Bayview Glenster Ratepayers in Markham and for Steeles Heights Community Incorporated in North York objected to the proximity of the high rise buildings and town houses to the existing private homes.

In the course of the hearing, the developer, Belmont Construction Company, agreed to move the three high rise buildings of ten and 12 storeys to a site 200 feet south of Steeles Avenue and 500 feet from existing single family homes to the east. The company also agreed to abandon the townhouse complex.

Henderson Avenue School Wins York Area 3 Track, Field Meet

In the annual track and field meet for Area 3 of York County, east division, six schools recently competed in a total of 54 events spread over six divisions determined by age and sex of the students competing.

Want Safe Brush Killer Checked For Pollution

When the Town of Markham called for tenders for weed cutting two bids were submitted, and both for the same price, so council agreed at a meeting June 29 to award contracts to both, dividing the work as equally as possible.

Tenders came in from Bert Hollands and Glen Baron, both of RR 1, Unionville, both offering the services of a man with tractor and mower for \$8.50 an hour.

Ward 2 Councillor Roy Muldrew moved that both companies be hired, and Ward 1 Councillor Robert Adams asked that the work be split evenly between them.

A contract for a supply of brush killer was approved conditionally. Again two bids were received. Niagara Chemicals of Burlington offered brush killer in five gallon cans at \$4.66 per gallon, and Maple Farm supply offered brush killer in five gallon cans at \$4.80 a gallon.

Ward 3 Councillor Keith Kennedy wanted to know how the chemicals offered rate with Pollution Probe. He was supported by Councillor Adams who pointed out that in using defoliants, council should be sure they do not contain chemicals not approved by pollution control authorities.

Regional Councillor Harold Lawrie pointed out that the Deferring of Highways has been spraying for more than a month, and Mayor Anthony Roman declared that spraying must start now, "or we will have to do it manually".

Mr. Adams countered that there need not be serious delay. "One phone call should do it."

Council accepted Ward 5 Councillor Murray Henderson's motion that the low tender Niagara Chemicals be accepted in five gallon cans at \$4.66 per gallon, and Maple Farm supply ordered are approved by the Department of Highways and the Metro Conservation Authority, or Pollution Probe.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Re: Transportation Area TOWN OF VAUGHAN

The Corporation of the Town of Vaughan has entered into agreements with the Toronto Transit Commission dated June 23rd, 1969, April 6th, 1971 and January 8th, 1971, whereby the T.T.C. will operate motor bus services from Steeles Avenue northerly on Islington Avenue, Keele Street and Yonge Street respectively. Under the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto Act the Town may, with the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board, create an area and charge any deficit or credit any surplus against the rateable property in the area. Since these will be purely local services, Council does not feel the deficit, if any, should be charged to the Municipality as a whole.

It is anticipated that the Islington Avenue service will operate at a deficit which would require a levy in that area of 1/2 of a mill, the Keele Street service would require a levy in that area of 1/2 of a mill and the Yonge Street service would require a levy in that area of 1/25 of a mill. The Department of Municipal Affairs has requested municipalities to have as few area charges as possible and in view of the small amounts involved and the resultant savings in administration costs, the Council has decided to create one transportation area. The proposed area is described as follows:

1. The lands situate in the Town of Vaughan being Lots 26 to 35 inclusive in Concession 1 of the Township of Vaughan or more particularly all the lands within an area bounded on the south by the northerly limit of Steeles Avenue, on the west by the easterly limit of Bathurst Street, on the north by the southerly boundary of King's Highway No. 7 and on the east by the westerly limit of Yonge Street.

2. Firstly: The lands situate in the Fourth Concession of the Township of Vaughan being the easterly halves of Lots 6 to 9 inclusive.

Secondly: The lands situate in the Fourth Concession of the Township of Vaughan being those parts of Lots 10 and 11 bounded on the east by Keele Street and on the west by the westerly limit of the Canadian National Railway lands.

Thirdly: The lands situate in the Fourth Concession of the Township of Vaughan being those parts of Lots 12 and 13 and the south half of Lot 14, bounded on the east by a line parallel to the westerly limit of Keele Street and 800' westerly thereof and on the west by the westerly limit of the Canadian National Railway lands.

Fourthly: The lands situate in the Third Concession of the Township of Vaughan being those parts of Lots 7 to 10 inclusive bounded on the west by Keele Street, on the north by the northerly limit of Lot 10, on the east by the westerly limit of the Canadian National Railway right-of-way and on the south by the south limit of Lot 7.

Fifthly: The lands situate in the Third Concession of the Township of Vaughan being that part of Lot 6 lying to the west of the Canadian National Railway right-of-way and to the north of Provincial Highway No. 7.

Sixthly: The easterly 2400' of Lots 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 in the Fourth Concession of the Township of Vaughan bounded on the south by the Canadian National Railway right-of-way and on the north by Provincial Highway No. 7.

Seventhly: The westerly 950' of Lots 2 and 3 in the Third Concession of the Township of Vaughan bounded on the south by the Canadian National Railway right-of-way and on the north by Provincial Highway No. 7.

Eighthly: The lands situate in the Town of Vaughan being Lots 1 to 10 inclusive, Concession 7 of the Township of Vaughan and including all of the former Village of Woodbridge or more particularly, all the lands within an area bounded on the south by the southerly limit of Lot 1, Concession 7, on the west by the easterly limit of the road allowance between Concessions 7 and 8 lying to the north and south of the former Village of Woodbridge and the westerly limit of the former Village of Woodbridge, on the north by the northerly limit of Lot 10, Concession 7, and on the east by the westerly limit of the road allowance between Concessions 6 and 7.

The total assessment of the rateable property in the proposed area is \$135,194,201.00 and it has been estimated that the system will, under present conditions, operate at a deficit and that the portion charged to the Town will be approximately \$31,750.00 per year. This will mean that the owner of a property in the area assessed at \$20,000.00 would be charged \$4.70 per annum. In view of anticipated development in these areas, the revenue should be increased substantially within the next few years which would reduce or eliminate the levy.

Take notice that in the event you wish to object to the approval by the Ontario Municipal Board of the proposed area, you should mail or deliver a notice in writing to the Clerk at the Municipal Offices in Maple prior to July 23rd, 1971.
