Half Acre Lots For Northwest Maple Residences

An amendment to Vaughan's Official Plan to permit a residential development on 49 acres of an 80acre parcel of land northwest of Keele Street and the Maple Sideroad, was recommended to town council by its planning committee, chaired by Councillor David Fraser, at its July 13 meeting. Developer is Killian Developments Ltd., Toro Road, Downsview which has an industrial subdivision on Keele Street.

It was noted that for some time this area has been designated urban on the Metro and Township of Vaughan's plans, although zoned agricultural. It was claimed the proposal represents infilling

of the community of Maple. Previous applications, about 10 years ago, it was recalled, were based on lot sizes in keeping with the development to the south (about 10,000 square feet) on a septic tank basis with water

vears ago were based on lot sizes of 10,000 square feet. In discussion with the region health unit and Town Planner John Dewar, the developers offered to improve the drainage of the area for septic tank use by excavating and backfilling with granular material, it was reported by John Gander, consulting

Later it was decided to increase the lot sizes to half an acre. (27,000 square feet) to give adequate tile bed drainage. The developers promised fuil co-operation in whatever may be needed to satisfy requirements of the town and of the health unit.

The subdivision will have access at one point on Keele Street North and at one point on the Maple Sideroad. Storm water will be taken care of through internal storm sewers, which will be taken westward along the Maple Sideroad to discharge subdivision and the area im- that 4.67 acres of parkland mediately to the north. A five-acre site on the Maple Sideroad has been reserved for a neighborhood commercial development immediately to the east of the present Beckers Shopping Plaza.

Mr. Fraser then reminded the public that the question to be decided was not design of the plan, size of lot, location of commercial development but whether or not residential development should be permitted in the area. "If you don't think so, then by all means let us know. If you are opposed to the plan itself, let us know so we will be aware of your feeling."


