# Markham Council Divided On Car Allowance For Arena Manager

New municipalities created by regional government are encountering numerous small unforeseen problems in making the transition.

In attempting to resolve one of these, Markham Town Council agreed August 10 to grant a \$500 increase in salary plus a car allowance of \$251 to Markham Arena Manager Ross McCarty.

Mr. McCarty was not included in the salary negotiations for municipal employees terminated on June 22. At that time inside employees were granted a \$500 increase retroactive from January 1. The increase in Mr. McCarty's salary from \$9,000 to \$9,500, it was pointed out, would be in keeping with the federally approved six percent increase.

There was considerable discussion, however, about the car allowance. The municipality, said Councillor James Jongenael, had established a policy of paying 14 cents per mile to employees using their own cars for municipal business. Councillor Roy Muldrew agreed, "We cannot change policy for one individual."

The matter of car allowance had been discussed some time ago, declared Mayor Anthony Roman, and it was not likely that the arena manager had kept track of his mileage since the first day of January.

Markham Councillor Harold Lawrie agreed, pointing out that in the area in which Mr. McCarty operates, the car was the only means of transportation, and through the winter months he made almost daily trips to the bank about one mile from the arena.

Mayor Roman added that there were others in the municipality who still receive car allowance, that the overall situation has not yet been reviewed.

Since a proposed \$250 car allowance for Mr. McCarty had been rejected by council earlier, a new motion was introduced and approved giving the arena manager an allowance of \$251 for his car for the current year.

It was also agreed that mileage and car allowances be reviewed before the end of the year.

# Council Defers House Numbering Proposal For North Richmond Hill

A house numbering proposal which would allocate 750 numbers to each mile and a quarter concession (one number for each 25 feet) and with the exception of Yonge and Bayview Streets in the old town of Richmond Hill would have continued the Toronto numbering system on north-south roads and tied in with the Vaughan system, proposed by the Municipal Service Company, was returned to the personnel, procedures and bylaws committee by Richmond Hill Council August 9.

Approval of the proposal and the recommendation that Municipal Service Company be hired to proceed with street numbering as per their proposal in the area bounded by the CPR road on the north, 19th Avenue on the west and the Bathurst Street on the east and the proposed 404 Highway on the east, were contained in a report from the above committee.

It looked for a time as if the two recommendations would be carried when an attempt to have them removed from the report was lost. However, when the whole report came up immediately afterwards for approval, that motion also was lost. Mayor William Lazenby, expressing bewilderment, repeated the votes with the same result.

It was then that Councillor Andy Chateaufort admitted he had voted against adopting the committee report because he could not support another of its recommendations, although not specifying which one.

Mayor Lazenby then ordered the report returned to committee, with instructions to bring the recommendations in as separate reports in order to get them carried.

# Danson Home Historic Site Says NY Society

The Willowdale home of York North MP Barney Danson is on the list of 35 historic sites classified by the North York Historical Society as worthy of preservation.

The society plans to ask North York Council to try to establish a special zoning category to protect 198 sites which date back to 1812 to remind future residents of the borough's history. If this cannot be done, the society suggests that funds be provided to

buy these buildings if they are threatened by development proposals.

A report prepared by the society lists nine churches and cemeteries, 13 homes, a tavern, a store and an old one-room schoolhouse.

The oldest building named is the frame house built by Joseph Sheppard in 1812. The Burdall Avenue House was built by William Lyon Mackenzie's commander, Colonel Van Egmont's hiding

place after the disastrous Battle of Montgomery's Tavern in 1813.

The Danson home on Harrison Road in the Bayview-York Mills area was built in 1828 by another Mackenzie supporter — William Harrison.

Also on the list are the Jolly Miller Tavern on Yonge Street south of York Mills Road built in 1856; the former home of Artist C. W. Jefferys built in the 1820's, and Dempsey Brothers store on the southwest corner of

Yonge Street and Sheppard Avenue.

Other properties cited include the one-room Zion School on Finch Avenue east of Leslie Street built in 1868, Downsview United Church built in 1870, and Fairbanks United Church on Dufferin Street which was built in 1889 and is still in use.
