## Former Vaughan Areas Streets Dark, Councils Decide Who Will Pay For Lights

When the Department of Municipal Affairs extended the boundaries of Richmond Hill to include part of the Township of Vaughan it created problems for a number of people.

In 1968 Vaughan launched a five-year street lighting program. All went so well that council decided the program could be completed in three years.

However, a number of streets that did not yet have street lights are now in Richmond Hill and the question is when will they get their lights and who will pay for them?

At a meeting of Richmond Hill Council August 16, Councilor Lou Wainwright, formerly a councillor in Vaughan, pointed out that there are still 54 lights to be installed. Streets without lights are Pemberton Crescent, the west end of Mill Street beyond Pleasantville Public School, Oxford Street and Regent Street from Oxford to Elgin Mills Road.

If these streets had remained in Vaughan, said Mr. Wainwright, they would have had their lights this year.

Vaughan did not debenture for the lights, he explained. Hydro in Vaughan is a committee of council and costs were paid from the municipality's current budget, which means that

## Vaughan Street Lights \$19,100

Vaughan Town Council approved expenditure of \$19,100 August 16 to go toward completion of a four-year street lighting program begun in 1967.

It was pointed out that the Town of Vaughan had provided \$19,100 in its current budget for the erection of street lights and council authorized the Vaughan Hydro to proceed with the erection of the street lights.

A report from committee-of-council noted that "since Bill 102 (1970) realigned the boundaries of local municipalities, the remaining capital for street lighting purposes for the Town of Vaughan is \$19,100 and for the Town of Richmond Hill, \$8,100."

"The Town of Richmond Hill will be responsible and liable for the cost of the erection of the proposed street lights on the streets that were formerly in the Township of Vaughan and are now in the Town of Richmond Hill."

Council will request its hydro commission to enquire if Richmond Hill is proposing to provide the street lighting as projected by Vaughan previously.

"If Richmond Hill supports the lighting of the streets in that portion of Vaughan which now is Richmond Hill it is conceivable that the unit price per fixture may be somewhat reduced because of the volume or quantity being purchased."

The objective of the original four-year street lighting plan was to have street lights on all residential streets, to update obsolete lighting fixtures and to provide lighting at concession road intersections.
