THE HYDRO-ELECTRIC COMMISSION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF VAUGHAN

Announces with regret that increases in costs necessitate a revision to the present rate schedule, for effect on and after January 1st, 1972. The necessary approval of Ontario Hydro was sought, and obtained for this change, on October 13th, 1971. The increase amounts to about 5.4% on average.
