* * * * Mayor Anthony Roman said, "The hall in Thornhill is not built and volunteers are not yet available. We are going to have to hire additional people to answer the phone, and whether it is in Thornhill, Unionville or Victoria Square doesn't make a bit of difference."

Chief Smith agreed. "We will pay the same for a telephone anywhere. We are trying to improve the department and will have to hire more firemen anyway."

In its program to improve the fire department, said Bonner, the fire committee intends to build up the volunteer brigade. But local employers feel they are paying enough in taxes for fire protection. They are not prepared to let workers go to fight fires, he said.

It was suggested the YRP might be willing to extend the police answering service at the Buttonville station for a month or two until Markham could work out its dispatching problems. Councillor Roy Muldrew moved that Regional Councillor Harold Lawrie, a member of the regional police commission, find out if police would continue to take calls in Markham until satisfactory alternative arrangements were

Bonner warned there is more to a dispatching service than a simple telephone installation. Even after a decision has been taken, the fire department will not have communications overnight, he said.

Chief Smith said the service in the long run would not be as costly as it appeared to be. Every time the siren sounds in Unionville, 20 volunteers respond. With a dispatcher who could determine the nature of the emergency before summoning firefighters, he said, might be necessary to call out only two or three volunteers. "We will save money with a dispatcher."


