Fights Enliven Contest Rams Rip Scarboro 9-2

A couple of third period battles enlivened things Tuesday night of last week as Richmond Hill Rams served notice on the opposition that they can fight as well as play hockey.

The choice is up to you. Learning their lesson for the night were members of the Scarboro Sabres as they lost a 10-4 Metro Junior "B" hockey game to the undefeated Rams as well as at least one of the two fights that broke out in a chippy third period. They probably lost the other one but it wasn't quite as decisive.

Some 700 spectators sat in on the oft-exciting although one-sided contest at the local arena as the Rams made it six wins and two ties in as many games to remain atop the 12-team loop standings by two games.

"They came out looking for trouble in the final period," commented Rams' Coach Karl Brimblecombe in reference to the Sabres' sword-rattling. "Well, we can handle trouble. We've got some tough boys out there. We won't be pushed around by anyone."

FLYING FISTS
One of the "boys" he was referring to was Defenceman Steve Lyon whom took after Scarboro's Joe Kelly in that third period and surrounded him with flying fists.

This assault by Lyon occurred about two minutes after Kelly had elbowed 14-year-old Bill Stephenson an act which amounts to rank heresy in the eyes of Richmond Hill players.

Lyon lined Kelly up on the boards, thumped him, and tried to skate away but this also offended Lyon who raced after Kelly and attempted to grind him into the ice.

The other fight was slightly more even as the Rams' Bill Weber and Scarboro's Paul Heaver locked arms in between some roundhouse swings. It was hard to tell who got the best or worst of this one.

OUTSHOT 64 TO 26
Meanwhile, back at the hockey game, the Rams spent most of the night intimidating a pair of Scarboro goalies as they lambasted them with 64 pucks compared to the 26 sent at Gordie Woolnough in the Richmond Hill nets. Rams outshot Scarboro 27-10 in the first period and 24-9 in the second.

Bob Volpe started in goal for Scarboro but was taken off for shock treatments after the third Ram goal at the five minute mark of the first period. In came a protesting, squealing Mike Bennie who finished out the game in sterling fashion.

Leading the Richmond Hill goal assault was Captain Wayne Stokes with three, followed by Dave Lumley and Daryl Rice with two each. Singles went to John Barnett, Craig Terry and Alex Pirus.

For the Sabres it was Rick Bourbonnais and Tim Snyder scoring two each.

JUST NOTES
Richmond Hill, as the score would indicate, was in charge all the way and the Scarboro goals resulted from some loose defensive play by the locals who relaxed a little at times.

Woolnough played a solid game in the Rams' net and had little chance on the ones that got by him as on almost every occasion the Scarboro scorers came in on him unattended.

Rice again came up with an impressive two-way performance and was particularly effective killing penalties.

Coach Brimblecombe was also happy with the play of Johnny Barnett and Randy MacDonald. Lyon, as usual, was outstanding.

MacDonald, incidentally, got clothes-lined by a Scarboro player in the final few minutes of that rough third period and was downed for a few seconds. No serious injury, heed.

Rice was selected Rams' "Player of the Week" last week.

The Richmond Hill Rams will be meeting the powerful Markham Seal-o-Wax team Tuesday night for the first time this season. As of writing, both teams are undefeated. Game time is 8 p.m. at the Richmond Hill Arena.

Markham, a farm team of the Junior "A" Marlies always comes up with a dangerous squad.

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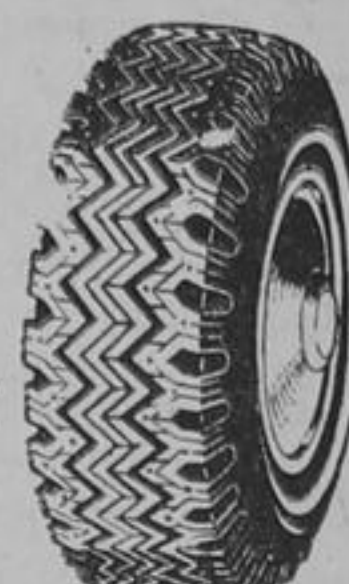

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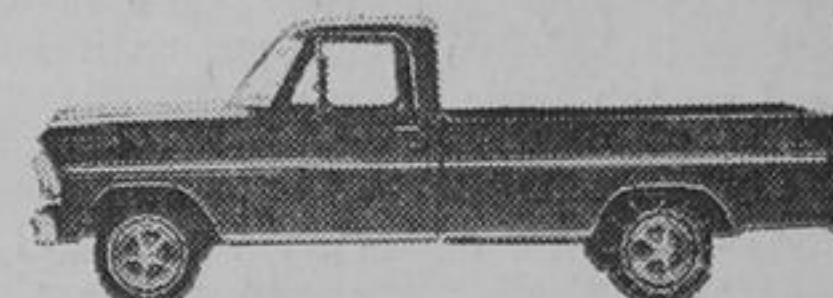
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
