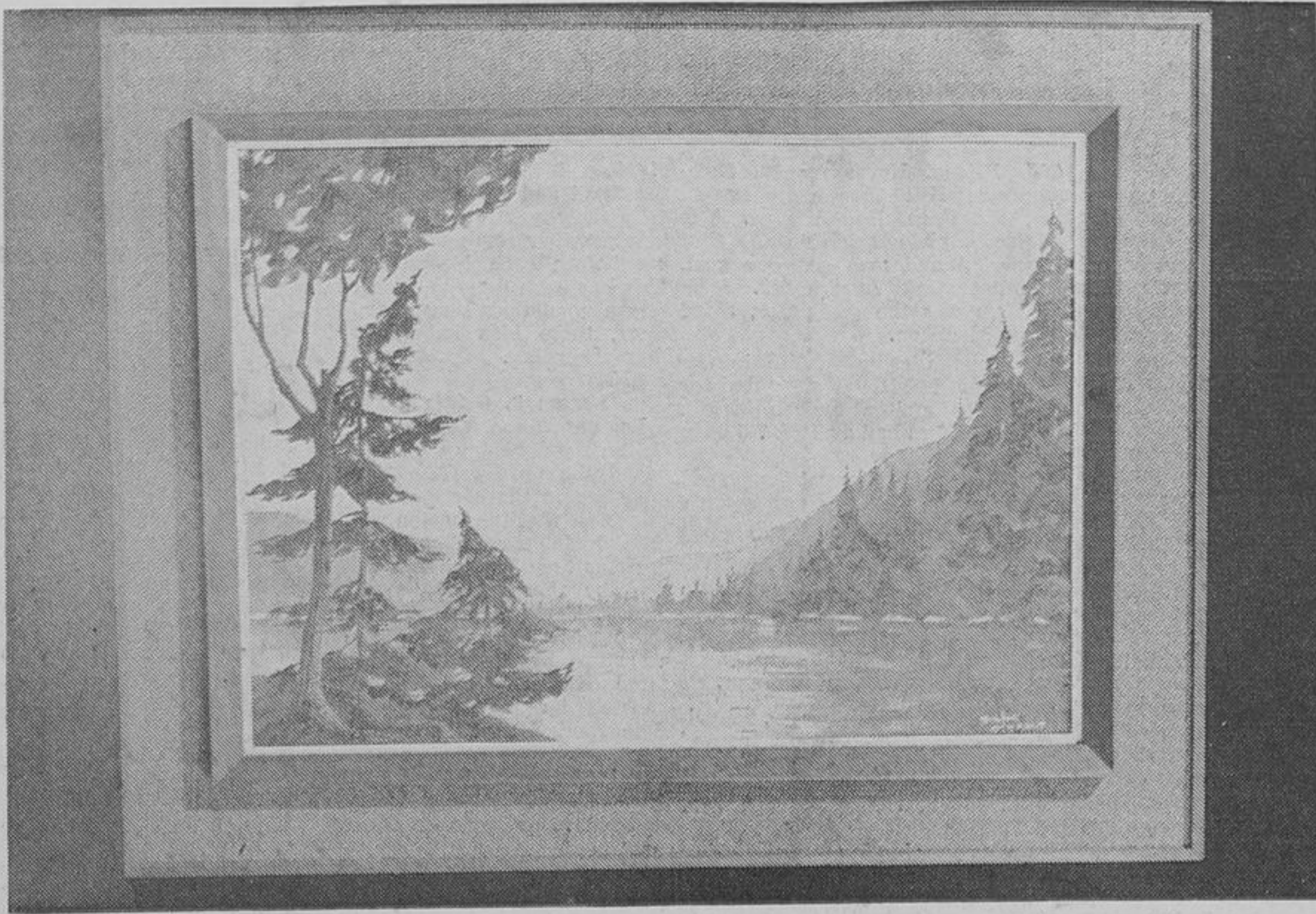
DO IT YOURSELF
