Traffic Pollution
Maple ratepayers were pleased to receive a letter from Kenneth Wilke of the Department of Environment, Waste Management Branch, last week, confirming an order being issued to Crawford Sand and Gravel to have the liquid waste removed from their premises, and to prepare for inspection, and a notice being sent to two waste haulers forbidding further dumping of this kind in this area.

Heartwarming co-operation was received from William Gled of Cadillac Lumber, who has taken steps to see that the conditions that were creating problems for the residents around were remedied.

He feels sure that the new warm-up units ordered for the diesels will reduce both the noise and fumes that are bothering neighbors.

A letter has also been received from the York Police Chief, Bruce Crawford, which assured the ratepayers that since May, the traffic radar control had been set up for a full 34 hours in Maple, during which time 73 tickets for speeding and 51 citations for improper loading had been issued.

Granting the large area covered by the police, and obviously overcrowded, we will leave these figures with our readers to decide the adequacy of our "service and protection".

A visit was enjoyed last week also, from Mrs. Pat Reid of Pollution Probe, noise control, who spent some time with members of the executive, and then proceeded to measure the intensity of noise of the traffic on Keele Street.

Many of the trucks so gauged, registered in the high 80's and some even in the 90's. Mrs. Reid was appalled at the density of the traffic as well as the noise levels, and sympathizes wholeheartedly with the cause of the local residents.

It is now on view among the more than 600 paintings of Group of Seven members and their contemporaries at Kleinburg. It may be seen daily, except Mondays, from 1 to 5:30 pm.

This major canvas of the senior Group of Seven member (who died in 1969) has been presented to the collection by Al Latner, president of Greenwin Developments, Toronto.

Metro Works Committee Vetoes Further Vaughan Use Of Sewer

Vaughan Councillor Dalton McArthur made his third trip to Toronto's City Hall in a month, November 16, to hear Metro Works Committee decide 3-2 against Vaughan's request for acceptance of sewage for 10,000 people in the trunk sanitary sewer which serves the former Village of Woodbridge.

McArthur told the Metro committee about 1,000 residents of Pine Grove on the eastern periphery of Woodbridge are without municipal sewage services at present and have to rely on septic tanks. These are already overloaded because of the character of the soil. He said development of three small proposed subdivisions would have made it financially possible for water and sewer lines to be installed to serve these homes.

McArthur said the sewer lines would have to flow into the Metro system until a comprehensive sewage and water system is worked out by the OWRC and the York Regional Government. This probably will take several years, he said.

POLLUTING HUMBER
Metro Planning Commissioner Wojciech Wronski told the committee the Pine Grove Village septic tanks are polluting the Humber River and creating an environmental problem. Despite this, he firmly opposed the Vaughan request because it was not part of a master plan to deal with water and sewage disposal needs of either Metro or York Region.

It is known Metro plans to build a giant water reservoir in Vaughan. In fact it has already acquired the necessary land for this project. It is also known that Metro hopes to acquire a large site or sites for sanitary landfill operation (garbage dump) in the new town. Both projects have several hurdles to clear.

Won't Ask Region No Demand In Vaughan For Day Care Centre

Vaughan Town Council has decided there isn't an immediate need for a day care centre in the municipality.

It was pointed out at the November 15 council meeting that a committee report had concluded "that the need for a centre in Vaughan is questionable at this time."

"The population of Vaughan is somewhat scattered over a wide area and families are more or less firmly established. In other words there has been no new subdivision of any account of late containing a number of young families where both parents work."

The committee further observed that "it is most certain that municipalities such as Aurora, Richmond Hill and Markham will be making submissions to the region because they have a relatively large number of younger families living in close proximity to one another."

Consideration of the need for a day care centre resulted from an announcement from Social and Family Minister Thomas Wells that a \$10 million program for centres "will be available over the next year to create as many as 150 new day nurseries all over Ontario, providing places for an additional 4,000 children."

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
