Hydro Route Location Meeting Set For King

A packed house is expected Tuesday night of next week when a public meeting will be held to discuss a proposed extra-high voltage hydro line across King Township.
The meeting will be held in Schomberg Community Hall at 8 pm.
Widespread opposition has resulted from Ontario Hydro's plan to cut a 610-foot wide swath through the municipality. About 1,000 residents have signed a petition against it.
Suggestions were advanced that the line run along the Trans Canada pipeline in Richmond Hill, as well as a more northerly route in King. Both suggestions were rejected by Ontario Hydro.
King Councillor Roy Wilson pointed out recently that council had never supported the hydro scheme.
Few objections were heard at a recent Newmarket meeting on the proposal.
More recently a public meeting on the same subject was held in Brockville, resulting in a heavy protest.
Citizens published a "flyer" representing Halton-Peel and Wellington-Waterloo denouncing the hydro route.

Two Fire Numbers In King Township

King Township is served with two fire and ambulance numbers now that the York Regional Police have stopped looking after calls.
Those in the area served by the King City exchange will still call 833-5213, while those in the area served by the Schomberg exchange will call 939-2333.
King Township has decided against an answering service type of project because their volunteer brigades' sirens are radio-activated. Vaughan has such a radio system.
The two phone lines will cost approximately \$100 per month. This is in addition to King's share of the cost of dispatching services. This cost is to be shared with Vaughan, according to population and assessment.
Residents who have been calling Aurora, Newmarket and Bradford for fire protection will continue to do so.

Brief Ratepayers On New Arena At Oak Ridges; Cost \$235,000

Interest in the proposed new Oak Ridges Arena was much in evidence Wednesday night of last week at the first annual meeting of the Ward 5 Ratepayers.
Special guests for the occasion were Richmond Hill Arena Board Chairman Bill McVean, Member Elzin Barrow, and Arena Business Administrator Ed Sackfield.
McVean told the 60 persons in attendance the association was attempting to get the arena built under the government winter sports program. The meeting was held at Lake Wilcox Public School.
"If we can swing it under winter works the government will subsidize most of the labor. Then we can repay the debentures at six percent interest rather than eight and a half or nine percent interest otherwise."
He said he expected the cost of the new arena will be \$235,000.
The debenture debt payments will be paid by the arena association out of revenue received from operation of the new building.
CONCRETE STRUCTURE
McVean said that the building will be a concrete block structure with a wooden laminated roof. Building time will be about four months with plans to have at least some ice in by the spring.
The arena will also house a community centre room able to seat 200 persons. The latter is under the jurisdiction of the Richmond Hill Parks and Recreation Committee.
Other business saw the election of a new executive for 1971-72 which will comprise, Keith Munro, Bill Corcoran, Ron Johnson, Bob Roth, John Bertelson, Roy Kingsley, and Gary Felix. The executive will choose its chairman at a later date.
Committee Member Roth reported on the success — or non-success — of a bi-weekly tabloid newspaper out during the summer months.
The paper, while highly successful in providing information to the ratepayers of Ward 5, "suffered from a lack of funds and a lack of citizen participation in its production."
