

The cheetahs and their brother, were imported into Canada for Joe Orsatti of Maple Avenue, who is housing them in a converted barn during their three-month quarantine, after which he will sell them at \$2,500 each. They are easily tamed and trainable and make excellent hunters or household pets.

On their arrival in Canada they spent several days with local veterinarian, Dr. John Mollard of Centre Street West being innoculated and receiving all the necessary shots and of particular interest is the fact that they received both canine and feline distemper shots, as they are susceptible to both.

Mr. Orsatti also has a wild mountain lion and a leopard and if he tames the cheetahs as he did the leopard, it won't be too long before they'll enjoy having their tummies tickled!
