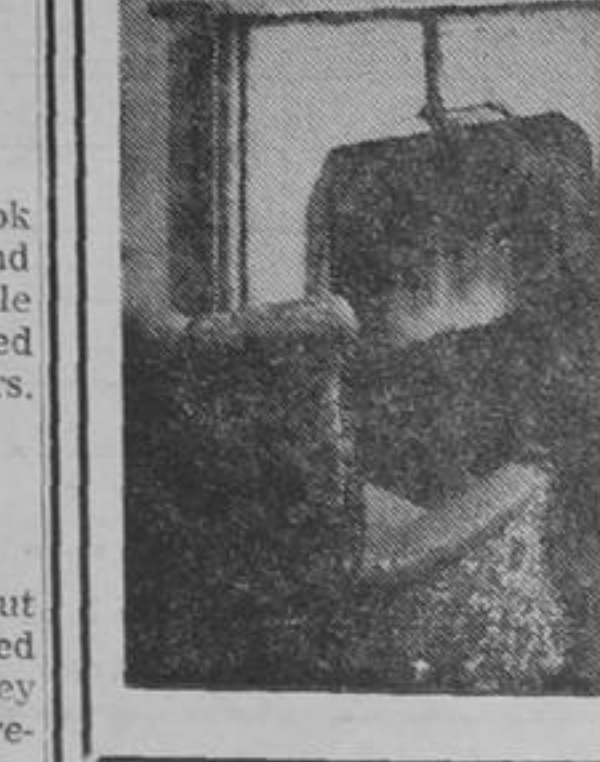
The defence by Eddy Gundert, Mike Fitzgibbon, Steve Cromb and Dave Sutherland was outstanding.
