Hydro Power Line Gets Mixed Reception

Ontario Hydro's controversial power line corridor proposal across King Township generated some familiar electricity Tuesday night of last week from 300 ratepayers at Schomberg Community Hall.
There was no evidence of any startling changes-of-mind both on the part of hydro officials and on the ratepayers.
Hydro obviously favors the southern route through King as opposed to the northern one in the Holland Marsh area.
A number of ratepayers obviously oppose the southern route from aesthetic to financial reasons plus a few dozen other reasons thrown in.
Yet a number of other ratepayers at the meeting favored the southern route for one major reason: They stand to make money if the hydro line goes through their property.
It was a case of figuring out how many favored the route and how many opposed it at the meeting. Applause was generous on both sides.
There was one ratepayer who didn't want the line in King Township at all. Opposed to this extremist view was an equally extremist one from an elderly lady who thought it would be a great thing to have Ontario Hydro go through the township.
"My property will be right next to the line," the lady exclaimed. "But it doesn't bother me. We need hydro. The people who are against

it would be the first ones to scream if we didn't have power."
One other termed the power line as setting "neighbor against neighbor in King Township."
Another said this was the case "because the ones who own the property to be taken by the power line can sell and move out. But what about their neighbors who stay and have to look at the power lines and see their properties devalued? This is the only reason you have one neighbor against another."
But of the furore at the community hall were several officials on Ontario Hydro including Ronald Miller, manager of property analysis and Robert Murray, supervising project engineer transmission and distribution project's division.
Both outlined the overall hydro line route which is one phase of a Southern Ontario grid system part of which will use King Township as a throughfare. The proposed 610-foot wide corridor will eventually comprise a series of 500 KV power stations across the municipality.
Mr. Murray said hydro plans were to increase its present power capacity by establishing a 500 KV line over the present 230. This would entail immediate construction of a series of two 500 KV power stations across the township with a third slated for a later date. Two more 230 line towers will

also erected.
He said that only one of the initial two 500 KV line towers would be in use by 1975, the second in 1976, and the third 500 KV line in the 1984-85 time period.
This inspired a reaction from ratepayers who pointed out that Hydro was asked at a January 1970 meeting in Schomberg to "provide a picture of five towers abreast as we were not satisfied with the carefully chosen shot of one line." It was felt that five towers would be much more of an eye-sore than one as shown in a photograph.
Margaret Britnell, former councillor of King Township, is firmly opposed to the southern route (which runs just north of Nobleton on a route which jogs northward to Newmarket) "which cuts through good building lots as well as beautiful country and destroys the aesthetic value of this land."
"I think we should appeal our assessment if hydro takes this route," she said. "The most feasible route would be a line more northerly through the Holland Marsh area which comprises a lot of bushland. This way we'll lose a \$100,000 worth of assessment."
She decried any comments that the northerly route would be much more expensive stating that "when you're dealing in billions of dollars as we are in this project a few more dollars is not that vital compared to the rights of ratepayers."
