Woodland School Studies Pioneer Life In This Area

Pioneer life has been the subject of intensive study by the grade 8 classes of Woodland

Senior School, South Thornhill, for several weeks. On November 23 the pupils presented a visual appreciation of that era in our history with displays of handmade articles and products of the farm and household, folk and square dances.

Included were samples of soap, candles, leather work, woodwork, candy, fudge and quilts. Highlight of the day was a fashion show, with the pupils and teachers wearing complete outfits from the pioneer days.




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
