**Awaits Council Approval**  
**Ok 14 - Lot Subdivision In-Filling At Oak Ridges**

A 14-lot subdivision in the Oak Ridges district, located on the east side of Parker Avenue, between Maple Grove Avenue on the south and Elm Grove on the north, was recommended for council acceptance by Richmond Hill Planning Committee December 20. This is the Appleton property, which will be developed by Orpa Holdings Limited (Jack Blyth, agent).

The applicant proposes to subdivide approximately 9 acres into single family lots having a minimum frontage of 77 feet and area of 14,000 square feet. It includes a proposed park and an area to be retained by the owner.

The site is part of the Humber River watershed, and is generally flat with drainage to the south. All lots would front on existing roads — all 66 foot road allowances with a gravel surface for traffic. The lot fee paid to the town will be \$655, and the developer will be required to regrade roadside ditches and a surface treatment on the three roads.

The proposed subdivision lies within the urban centre designated area of the official plan of King Township, which still controls development in that area. The subdivision complies with the requirements in all respects, it was reported.

The area is served by a municipal water supply and it is proposed to install individual septic tanks. The Regional Health Unit, however, has stated that it will require more information and further soil tests before approving these installations. Hydro, telephone and natural gas service is available.

It is estimated the development would produce 14 elementary school pupils, which can be accommodated in existing schools in the area.

The town's parks and recreation committee has requested a contribution of 5% of the finished land value in lieu of dedication of parkland, which will be used for park purposes in the future.

Other recommendations are that the approval of the final

plan be subject to installation of individual septic tanks approved by the town, the medical officer of health and the Ontario Water Resources Commission, and that each single family residential lot be planted with at least one tree.

**Villa Hospital Gains Accredited Status Serving The Chronically Ill**

Since the privately owned Villa Hospital on Bathurst Street in Vaughan opened in 1956 it has grown from 12 beds to 113 beds. This month it became an accredited hospital, meeting standards of patient care set by the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation over and above standards required for licensing by the Ontario Hospital Services Commission.

The hospital has two sections. There are 41 beds for young people from 13 years up and who are chronically ill. These patients are suffering from muscular dystrophy, spinal cord injuries and other afflictions. The remaining beds are for older people requiring nursing home type of care.

There is close liaison between the Villa and York Central Hospital where patients are sent for X-ray and laboratory examinations and active treatment. A group of four local physicians headed by Dr. James Langstaff serve as an advisory committee in matters concerning policy and medical management. Many family physicians and specialists come in regularly to supervise care of their own patients.

**HUSBAND-WIFE TEAM**  
Owners and directors of the hospital are Mr. and Mrs. Donald Stewart. Mrs. Stewart is director of nursing. Hospital administrator is Lois Wilcox who has a degree in nursing science and administrative work. Mrs. Margaret Barenthin is recreational director.

Many of the young people go out to school, while others receive instruction from teachers who come into the hospital. Some attend night classes in local schools, particularly the hobby and leisure time classes. There are arts and crafts at the hospital, too, and each year the patients have a bazaar where they sell their work to the community. Proceeds go to the "Wheelchair Fund" to buy little extras that can make life more interesting for the patients. The bazaar this year was on December 4 and brought in about \$400.

**COMMUNITY HELPS**  
Patients and staff are grateful for the interest shown by the community, says Mrs. Stewart. Firemen regularly come to take patients on snowmobile excursions around the hospital's 20-acre site, and a wheelchair bus donated by Richmond Hill Lions has made it possible for patients to attend functions outside of the hospital.

Numerous volunteers also bring something of the outside world to the hospital on Bathurst Street, south of Carville Road where the majority of patients spend many years of their lives.

Although it is privately owned and operated, the Villa is recognized by the Ontario Hospital Services Commission and patients receive full benefits from the provincial hospital insurance plan.

To her knowledge, says Mrs. Stewart, it is the only place in Ontario that makes social provision for chronically ill young people.

December 31 saw the closing of the most active year of training in Patriot's history. During the summer fifteen young men completed two weeks' training at Canadian Forces Base Cornwallis, Nova Scotia, while twelve more spent two weeks at CFB Quadra, British Columbia. West coast training included overnight sea trips in open boats, as well as instruction in Naval techniques.

Richmond Hill's "Navy" was also represented at the International Sailing Regatta in Halifax, Nova Scotia. The two lads from Patriot placing ninth in the long list of competitors.

Two more cadets joined the crew of the Canadian Coast Guard Cutter Alert for two weeks patrolling the cold waters of the North Atlantic.

A six week training course was taken by two senior cadets, to better equip them for leadership within the unit. Boys from Patriot totalled more than 65,000 miles travelling in Canada from coast to coast.
