



# Effective January 3 Travelways joins

Bus service out of the Richmond Hill GO Terminal will be increased 50 per cent when Travelways joins the GO System. Travelways buses will operate southbound from the Terminal (after picking up passengers from the northeastern section of Richmond Hill) via Markham Road, Bayview, Steeles, Yonge and Front Street to the Royal York Hotel. After 10:15 a.m. Travelways buses will not go south of Edward Street, but proceed direct to the Travelways Bay and Edward Street Terminal.
