**MERANER - SCHNITZEL**  
1 1/2 lbs. veal or pork cut into 6 oz. cutlets approx. 1/4" thick.  
8 l. oz. slices of Swiss Gruyere cheese.  
Salt, pepper, garlic butter (for frying) and tomato sauce.

Salt, pepper and garlic cutlets. Heat butter in frying pan. Fry cutlets for approx. 2 mins. on each side. About 3/4 done. Place cutlets on baking sheet and cover with two slices of cheese per cutlet. Put under broiler approx. 6" from element and broil until cheese starts to bubble. Remove and set on individual serving plates. Cover each with approx 3 ozs. of tomato sauce. Return to broiler approx. 30 seconds. Garnish with chopped parsley or chives.

**YW-YMCA's Celebrate "Y" Week In Canada**

Next week is "Y" Week in Canada when YWCA's and YMCAs across the country will be making a special effort to inform the public about new developments within the movement.

Theme for the week is "People...Helping Change Happen".

Both organizations pre-date Confederation, and today millions of Canadians support or participate in "Y" activities.

Both organizations were basically evangelical when started over a century ago. As they evolved and matured, says Holbrook Davis, YMCA president of Canada, their range of concerns was expanded to include the social, recreational and physical needs of the people.

Officials to the "Y's" acknowledge that the continuing success of programs in gyms, camps and club rooms often tend to overshadow increasing involvement with modern day problems arising from urbanism, technological change and social tension.

The two organizations are therefore focussing in on many computer-age problems that they believe would become self-perpetuating if ignored or mishandled.

In many ways, they say, the problems are inter-related and no single group can hope to provide all the answers. Friction between different age groups is intensifying. Social, ethnic and economic fragmentation create further discord. Pollution and unemployment are grim realities.

The "Y's" of Canada have the resources and skill to prepare guidelines and create opportunities for people to participate in the search for answers says Mrs. P. J. Chadsey, president of YWCA of Canada.

The theme of the 1972 Canadian "Y" Week — "People...Helping Change Happen" — is therefore particularly appropriate.
