Concord Fire Victims Still Homeless

Still looking at press time for a suitable home in a country setting where they can keep their big dog are Carol and Lawrence Lonero and their two-year-old daughter who attends nursery school in Thornhill. The Loneros had no insurance when they lost all their household possessions in a fire that destroyed their rented home on Dufferin Street in the Concord area of Vaughan Town on January 2.

"Finding the kind of home we want is a rather difficult matter this time of year. If we had a place to put it, we could probably scrounge enough household stuff to get by. The demand seems to far exceed the supply of homes for our kind of country living," said Lonero. The family has been staying with neighbors Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Ginsberg at the old Witty farm on Dufferin Street.

They have offers of help from the Maple Lions, friends and people in the neighborhood if they could find a place to live. Vaughan Fire Chief James Davidson says there has been no further report so far on the fire. A Fire Marshal's investigation was started when evidence of a break-in was found at the scene.
