

**To Repair
Town Signboard**

Richmond Hill Town Council has decided to shore up, repair and paint the signboard in the south Yonge Street area and purchase two sets of inserts.

The one set will carry a welcome to Richmond Hill. The other set will be reserved for advertising various events in the town, the sponsors to pay for the cost of painting them and for installation and removal.

Councillor Shaun Beggs reported total cost of renovating the sign, including the two sets of inserts, will be \$750 and was authorized by council to make this expenditure, at its January 10 meeting.

Mr. Beggs also volunteered to act as the contact man for those groups wishing to use the signboard to advertise events.

New Guidelines May Come In April

Strict Septic Tank Requirements

Requirements of the Region of York Health Unit for private sewage disposal systems (septic tanks and tile beds) have come in for severe criticism in areas of the region (including some sections of Richmond Hill) during the past year.

To clarify its requirements, the health unit has circulated a copy of its policies for the information of councils and committees of adjustment. These policies were studied by Richmond Hill Council January 10.

The policies, now in force, are as follows:

For a vacant lot with no services, the minimum requirements include 15,000 square

feet, water table at five feet, no fill allowed.

For a vacant lot with one service, the minimum requirements include 7,500 square feet, water table at five feet, no fill allowed.

For an existing permanent dwelling on an undersized lot, with a malfunctioning septic tank system, a drilled well will be regarded as the equivalent of one service, if possible.

Where the minimum level of the water table is in doubt in dry times of the year, the test cut must be done in the spring.

Percolation tests and solid sampling may be required at the discretion of the health unit.

Repairs to existing malfunctioning systems will be judged on their individual merits, but will be allowed if at all possible.

Fill will be allowed only if both adjacent lots are already filled, or to repair an existing malfunctioning system.

Where surface water is a problem, if only in the spring, approval for a septic tank system will not be given.

Where a house is being re-

novated from a summer cottage to a permanent dwelling, the lot must meet full standards before approval for a septic tank system will be given.

The health unit also reports being informed by the Water Resources Commission that no more hookups are to be made to existing private water systems. Therefore, any lots in areas ostensibly serviced by these systems must be 15,000 square feet in area.

On lots of approximately two acres, the health unit says it would allow elevated tile beds depending on the circumstances.

The health unit's authority for making these regulations comes under the Public Health Act. Some flexibility may be used at the discretion of the medical officer of health in individual cases, based on their own merits.

The health unit also points out it is quite possible new guidelines will be issued by the province in April. These could include the use of elevated beds and/or the use of lots smaller than 15,000 square feet when the wells are drilled.
