The bylaw covers everything from whistling Dixie to the sounding of bells. Also covered are roaring cars or ski-doos, and playing music too loudly.

The rather touchy portion of the bylaw lies with the qualifying phrases.

You can do some of the above things as long as they don't create an "unusual" noise, or disturb the peace, quiet and customary repose of any person." Such things as that.

Mayor Mactaggart pondered as to how you would decide what constituted an unusual noise.

"You take it to court," commented one councillor. Mayor Mactaggart wondered again how "you would prove the whole thing. How can you prove a noise is too loud? You might have to tape record

King Wants No Part Of Hydro Powerline A Chance To Discuss Ward Five Problems

An Ontario Hydro official got a polite but firm brushoff Monday night of last week when he appeared before King Township Council to clear up what he considered to be some confusion over the proposed high voltage power installation through King's portion of the Region of York.

There was no confusion as far as council was concerned. They don't want any power line through the municipa-




