

Two hundred miles from your mother ship, you're stranded on the moon. The members of your group are nearly totally unfamiliar with one another. Yet, with only the basic survival needs supplied you must work together - if you want to live.

In today's society the ability to work with other knocked down by a car about results are not only loss of people, individually or as a team is invaluable. But to be able to work competently you must be aware of the other people involved.

This is why Thornlea offers a special unphased English course called "Perception And Communica-

James Allen, head of Thornlea's English Department is responsible for the creation of the course. Teachers Larry Davies and Bob Morgan run the classes which are open to the whole school. "Each individual perceives the world differently.

Although two people witness the same event, their perception of what really happened will be influenced by their backgrounds and personalities." Mr. Davies continued explaining the purpose of the course. "The aim of the course is to make each

individual aware of language and its implications both in the classroom and social situations.' "By helping students to an awareness of other people in groups or individually we hope that their performance both in the classroom and in day-to-day

life will benefit." This is the reason for exercises like the "moon" game, to promote co-operation and show the importance of teamwork.

"One of the basic problems today is that no one listens to one another. People are so wrapped up in themselves that they don't communicate prop-

In order to fight this Mr. Davies has a special exercise that the students do.

"We start a discussion and then halfway through throw in a few rules. Such as, before you can talk you have to repeat the point made by the student before you. It's surprising how it improves a discussion when everyone is really listening." Mr. Davies felt that this was one of the most

important aspects of the course. "Listening to what a person says is important. But sometimes what he says is not what he really means."

This is where another part of the course comes "So many people have inhibitions about their

body", he said. "Particularly North Americans." There are three basic distances that people keep within their "spatial bubbles". One is the "intimate zone", where only the closest of friends are allowed. This is the point at which your body comes in contact with the other person.

ordinary conversational distance. The "public zone", for example, is the distance between a speaker and his audience.

communication between people, as well as the Since inhibitions are barriers to understanding, they must be dispensed with.

It is for this purpose of communication and perception between individuals that Thornlea offers this rather unusual course. If it teaches students how to work better in

groups and interact more fully in society then it has achieved its goal. Right now the classes are pretty well filled to capacity and both teachers think the course is

"really good" So good, in fact, that Mr. Allen is thinking of opening enrollment to the community during Thornlea's third term.

The course will be offered as day long "workshops" at the North Thornhill Community Centre. Since a mixed group of adults and students would present greater learning opportunities and so greater variety of ideas, adults are especially invited to join in.
