Richmond Hill United Church Needs \$50,000 Rehabilitation

A large and responsive crowd received the annual reports of Richmond Hill United Church for the year 1971 recently and adopted an interim budget for 1972, pending completion of a study by the congregation's planning and development committee.

The reports revealed that membership increased slightly during last year — from 848 to 857 and the church school enrollment almost doubled — to 225.

Total receipts reported by the congregation and its organizations was \$79,091 and total expenditures were \$79,668.

Outreach expenditures totaled \$15,504, that is for every dollar spent locally the congregation gave away 25¢ besides retiring a total of \$6,000 indebtedness.

It was noted that because of stringent financial conditions it had been necessary to get along with one minister instead of two, with resultant neglect of a number of traditional areas of ministry; and that no funds had been available for either repairs of the buildings.

The congregation honored Mrs. Margaret Weber with a presentation to mark her retirement as church secretary.

Elected as honorary elders, in recognition of their years of leadership in the church, were Franklin Brown and John Spanner.

Following adjournment of the annual meeting Donald Frise presented phase one of the report of the planning and development committee.

The report noted that the congregation is apparently pleased with the direction in which things are moving but has requested a number of additional programs and services and are uneasy about existing debt and the state of the buildings.

The property committee has indicated it will cost a minimum of \$50,000 to rehabilitate the present buildings and the stewardship committee proposes three schemes that would enable some or all of this work to be done and the planning and development committee notes some characteristics of the future that must be taken into account before any decisions about property or staff are made.

Therefore, four questions have been proposed to be answered by the congregation on Pilgrimage Day II, tentatively scheduled for February 27.

Two New Missionaries

Richmond Hill Area

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) has assigned two new missionaries to the Richmond Hill area. Elder Gordon Anderson and Elder Larry Duryk recently replaced Elders Orr and Nielson, who have been transferred to another area.

Elder Anderson is a native of Shelley, Idaho. Prior to his entrance into the mission field, he completed one year of study as a psychology major at Ricks College, a school sponsored by the "Mormon" Church. He was transferred here from the Oshawa area.

Elder Duryk is from Lloydminster, Saskatchewan, and attended one year at the University of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon, where he took a general arts and science course. Before coming to the Ontario - Quebec Mission he spent several days at church headquarters in Salt Lake City, Utah, where he and about 250 other new missionaries received instruction from church leaders.

In Richmond Hill, these young men will be engaged in visiting families at home, showing films, holding street meetings and open houses in order to acquaint people with the beliefs and principals of their church.

We really love it here in Richmond Hill," says Elder Anderson. "The people we have met have been very receptive and open minded. We invite those who are interested to attend our Sunday services at 10:30 am and 5:30 pm at 112 Crosby (downstairs in the Masonic Hall).

The "Mormon" Church was organized in April 1830 and missionary work commenced that same year. Since then, the missionary program has grown to include over 15,000 missionaries who are working in every nation of the free world. There are 240 laboring in the Ontario-Quebec Mission. These missionaries devote two years of their lives and receive no pay except from the satisfaction of knowing they are serving God and their fellow men.

After completing his mission Elder Anderson plans to continue his education at Brigham Young University, another church-sponsored school. Elder Duryk is planning a police career and hopes to join the RCMP eventually.

High Lights
Richmond Hill High School News

The last issue of the school paper, Optimum, contained an article whose purpose it was to scold the masses for their general apathy in such areas as basketball games, clubs, and other extra-curricular activities, adding that academics are not the sole purpose for a student's attending school.

This point seems debatable in that most basketball games are fairly well attended (as basketball games go), no clubs are as yet in danger of extinction due to lack of student support, and as was illustrated at the Winter Carnival, school spirit is capable of reaching an almost violent pitch when faced with the competition of three neighboring schools.

What is not debatable, however, is the lack of student interest in the actual running of their school. Not so remarkable, really, for what with basketball games, various clubs, and marks to consider, only the truly dedicated will be willing to sacrifice what free time they have managed to squeeze out of a week.

Nevertheless the question must be asked whether this situation is a desirable one, whether there is any way a balance between extra-curricular activities, academics, and the running of the school can be reached.

The student staff liaison committee was created in the hope that through it such matters as student-teacher relationships, exams, exemption requirements, late rooms and subject programmes could be discussed freely and openly. It and the student's council are the two bodies that offer the student's some say in the affairs of their school. But attendance at the meetings is, shall we say — limited — perhaps due to the fact that they are always being postponed because not enough committee members themselves were able to attend on the scheduled date.

This sort of disinterest is fine, so long as we are prepared to accept the consequences. There is a saying that each community receives the kind of government it deserves.
