## No Inquest Held Sudden Death

There won't be any inquest into the sudden February 3 death of well-known long-time Lake Wilcox area farmer Delbert Baker, 65, of RR 1, Gormley, says Bernard Granton, coronor.

York Region Police said Baker was found apparently dead beside his car at about 7 pm at a location locally called Baker's gravel pit.

Mrs. Baker became worried when her husband had been away too long to feed the dogs and asked Ferdinand Provost of 5 Elm Grove Avenue to check. Provost found the car and man in the snow, so called police.

Mr. Baker is survived by his wife, the former Gertrude Cook; children Howard, Kenneth and Donna (Mrs. John Honsberger); 10 grandchildren and brothers Ernest and Earl. The funeral was from the Marshall Funeral Home, 126 Yonge Street North, Richmond Hill, to Gormley Missionary Church for service February 7 in the afternoon. Interment was at Heise Hill Cemetery.

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
