Kleinburg Ratepayers Fight To Save Community

A local organization which deserves the support of every resident of this area is the Kleinburg and Area Ratepayers Association.

The group was conceived in September 1967 when Vaughan Township Planning Board unveiled a proposed secondary plan calling for rapid subdivision of the Milani-held farmland surrounding Kleinburg to a population of about 7,300.

This plan included high-rise and row housing and was unanimously rejected by the ratepayers.

In February, 1970, the developer came back to the planning board with another plan, which turned out to be a carbon copy of the first one. In April, Vaughan Council instructed its planners to come up with yet a third plan which was not too different. However, the Toronto-Centred Plan unveiled by the Ontario Government in May, 1970, delayed an implementation of this plan, since Kleinburg was indicated to lie in a low-density development area.

During the summer of 1971 another proposed plan for the Kleinburg area was sent to the association along with a request for 20 representatives to meet with the Town of Vaughan's Planning Committee. In this plan the population was reduced by developing less area, but with the same high-rise apartment buildings and dense housing.

The ratepayers' objections were resented both verbally and in writing and it was agreed that a committee consisting of Ben Vass, Murray Rowan, Pierre Bertson and Jack Leslie should draft a brief summary of a housing development acceptable to the residents of the area, which would meet with the regulations of the Toronto-

Centred Plan and of York Region. After one fairly satisfactory meeting with the planning committee a second was arranged. For some disclosed reason this was cancelled and the town has not called another.

GARBAGE DUMP
And then there is the fight against the garbage dump in the Connor pit.

In the spring of 1971, Vaughan Council made known its intention of converting the 37-acre gravel pit at Highway 27 and the Maple Road into a 200 foot high, 110-acre mountain of garbage. A petition opposing this was signed by 1,200 residents from all areas of Vaughan and many concerned people established a fund to obtain legal counsel. Despite this massive opposition, council voted in favor of purchasing Connor's pit for \$100,000 for sanitary landfill operation with the only dissenting vote being cast by Councillor Gordon Risk.

The trustees of the "No-Dump Fund" promptly filed a restraining injunction which was granted on a temporary basis. On review, a second judge dissolved the injunction but gave the trustees leave to appeal and the Town of Vaughan is now defendant in a restraining action. Funds are still being solicited to defray legal costs.

MEMICHAEL GALLERY
Another problem dealt with last summer by the association was a proposal to extend the parking at the McMichael Collection of Art in close proximity to the houses in Kleinburg Estates. KARA supported the Kleinburg Estates Ratepayers in opposition to the extension of the parking lot and a report on this is expected soon. The association reminds the residents of Kleinburg that there is reason to hope for a

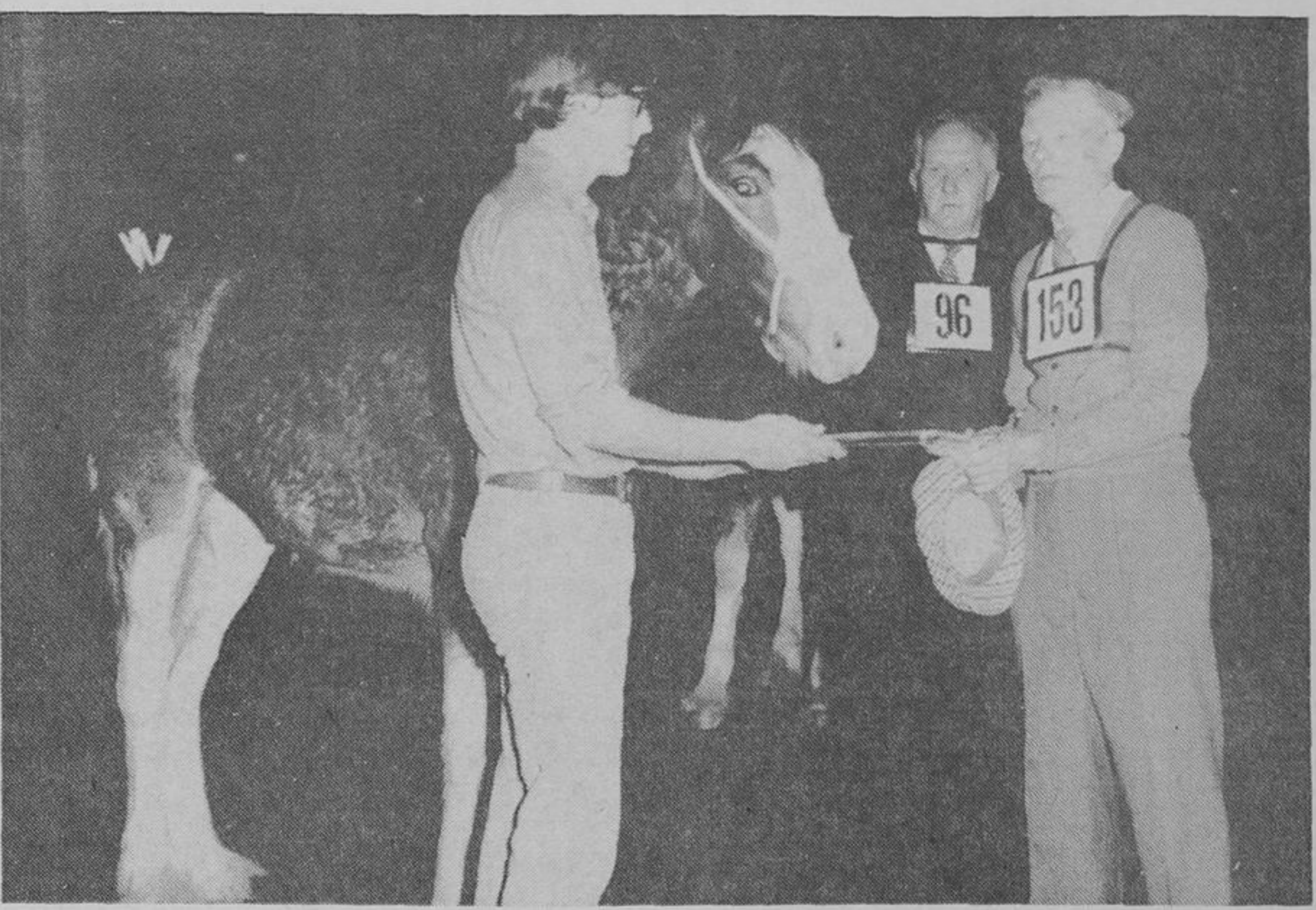
Vaughan Mayor Williams Says

Mayor Williams said Vaughan Town Council has always supported Richmond Hill Cable TV from the time of its initial application, sending representatives to several hearings. It was council's expressed wish that the whole municipality be served by the one cable company. Therefore, it was disappointing to have the CRTC omit



Concord Youth And Filly Set Royal Record

Robert Martin, 17-year-old younger son of Mr. and Mrs. John Martin of Concord, set a record at last fall's Royal Winter Fair. His feat hasn't been equalled since the fair started in 1922.

Robert is the proud owner of "Bardrill Castles Hilda", a Clydesdale filly foal, which he exhibited at the fair. The filly came up with the following impressive wins to set the record: first prize foal, junior champion female, best Canadian bred and owned female any age, sixth for showmanship, the \$500 prize donated by A. Busch Junior and the trophy for the supreme Canadian championship male or female.

This was the most wins with one horse and one exhibitor since the Royal started. Robert, a student at St. Andrew's College, is the fourth generation of the Martin family to exhibit registered Clydesdales in the last century. He keeps his horses on the farm of his uncles, Fred and Goldie Martin of Paramount, Highway 86 west of Lucknow, who gave him the mother of the winning foal.
