

Adults, Students Grade 8 To 13 Wide Choice Of Summer Courses

Adults in the Region of York who have four hours to spare each morning for six weeks next summer will be able to take a secondary school course for diploma credits.

The proposal was put forward and approved by trustees at a meeting of York County Board of Education February 28.

A report presented to the meeting by the board's Administrator of Adult Education and Summer School Programs, Lloyd Morrison, listed courses in three categories: reinforcing courses for credit, new courses for credit and non-credit courses.

Advanced level (five year) credit courses will be available in Latin, computer science, geography, creative writing, comparative religions, art and history, but not at all grade levels.

General level (four year) credit courses will be given in drafting shopwork and basic auto for girls at grade 9 level. There will be courses in mathematics at grade 10, 11 and 12 levels and biology and Man In Society at grade 12 level. Several non-phased courses will also be available in physical education, theatre arts, bookkeeping, typewriting and office practice.

FOR HIGHER MARKS
Reinforcing courses for credit

will be available for students who either failed the subject or wish to improve their standing in it. These will be in various academic and commercial areas and will not be available for adults.

Non-credit courses for enrichment or interest will be offered in art, outdoor science, mathematics, music, home economics, oral French, development reading, self-development and driver education.

There is usually too much demand for these courses, which are held for two hours per day, said Morrison, that it is not possible to offer them to adults.

FOR GRADE 8
There would also be courses for grade 8 students who are promoted in June from grade 8 to grade 9 with a recommendation from their principal that they take summer school courses in English, mathematics or reading.

Grade 8 students who fail to earn promotion in June will also be able to enrol on recommendation by the principal, selecting two courses from English, mathematics and reading.

Grade 8 students who want to take refresher courses in these three basic subjects may also be enrolled providing their principal is willing to recommend them. All grade 8 students will attend for four hours a day. Those in the first and second group will attend for six weeks. Those in the third category will attend for only three weeks.

Summer school classes will be held in Thornhill Secondary and in Huron Heights Secondary, Newmarket, from July 3 to August 11. If there are insufficient registrations, however, some courses may be withdrawn.
