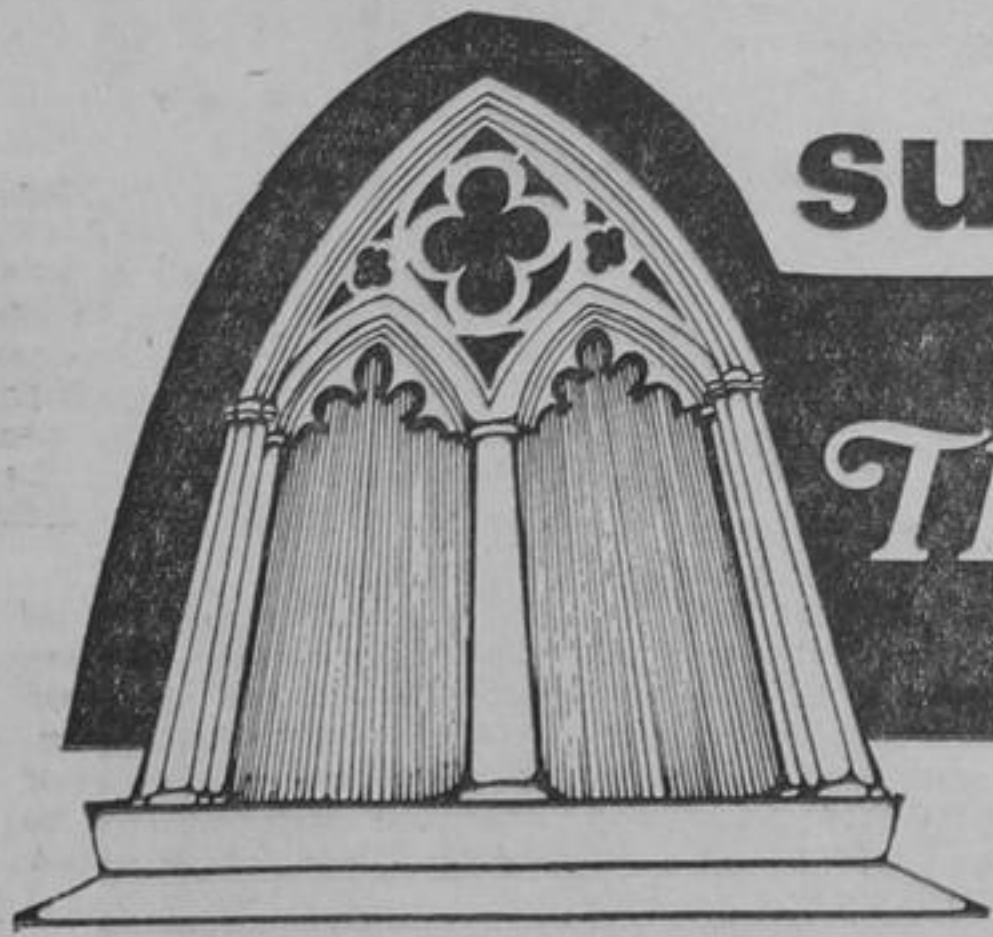

Good Crowd Attendance Midget Tourny Opens

Everything was pointing toward the best attendance figures ever Monday as the fifth annual Richmond Hill Tournaments Incorporated week-long hockey show kicked open its doors.
 Tournament President Frank Murphy said that attendance figures on the first day were up over last year with 1,726 spectators filing through the turnstile in 1972 compared to 1,434 on the first day of the 1971 tournament.
 "Excellent is about the best word I can find," said Murphy. "Everything has run smoothly to date without any major problems. We had to shift our schedule slightly to allow for the Richmond Hill Rams game Tuesday night but we were quite agreeable to that."

The Rams executive got in the holiday mood of the tournament by reducing admission to the game to hockey playing members of the various teams.
 Tuesday morning's games saw a number of teams fall by the elimination games got underway after Monday's initial start.
 One of the victims was the popular team from Levaek which was shunted to the sidelines in a 3-2 game loss to the Toronto Foster Firebirds. It was Levaek's first loss of the season.
 "They were ready to pack up and leave for home," said Murphy. "They almost blew the roof off when we told them their tickets would be available the week so they could watch the conclusion of the tournament."
 The same team ran into an unfortunate situation at another tournament last season when they were eliminated from competition and had to leave for Levaek at 1:30 a.m. because their billeting time had expired.
 Other tournament games Tuesday saw Ottawa Canadians downing Oakville 4-0; Detroit over Toronto Marlies 4-2; Hamilton 8, St. Clair Shores, Michigan 4.

The Richmond Hill Legion Midgets were slated to go against Burlington at 5 p.m. Tuesday with the winner of that one to enter the Series "A" quarter finals Wednesday at 3:30 p.m. against either North York Rangers or Niagara Falls. The winner of this match will meet in the "A" semi-finals Saturday at 1:30 p.m.
 Games Saturday will see the "B" finals going at 5:30 p.m. and the "A" and "B" series' against one another.
 Only one accident marred an otherwise injury-free tournament in its first two days. This occurred Tuesday when a player on the Ottawa Canadians broke his ankle.
 Murphy spoke glowingly of all of the tournament executive but particularly of the billeting committee comprising Mr. and Mrs. Bob Oakley and Mrs. Margaret Brickles.
 "They've done a tremendous job," he said. "It's very important to the success of a tournament to have an efficient billeting service going for you."
 The 20 tons of food as provided by the tournament committee and served up by the Legion Ladies' Auxiliary is also keeping the smiles coming from hungry eaters.
 The players are provided with lunch and dinner — Monday's lunch was homemade baked beans and weiners. Dinner was roast beef, baked potatoes, salad ice cream and milk.

 When Dunne refused to give them money, he was shot in the thigh and \$30 was taken.
 Dunne was taken to hospital but refused to be admitted.

Bill, Dick Weber The Heroes Rams Eliminate Dixie Beehives

The Weber Boys struck again Tuesday night as the Richmond Hill Rams followed their patented route in eliminating Dixie Beehives from the 1972 Metro Junior B hockey playoffs. They now meet Markham in the finals.
 They trailed 3-0 at the end of the first, came back to tie the game at 3-3 in the third, and won it 4-3 in the 10-minute overtime.
 It was Bill Weber taking an across-the-ice pass from Dick Weber at 14:11 of the final period and blasting a shot past Dixie goalie Pat Devlin to tie the game at 3-3. Devlin heard it go by but he didn't see it.
 This brought the arena roof down as one of the biggest crowds ever—2,223 paid attendance—went into mass convulsions. One excited fan thumped the glass partition of the press box and almost shattered it.
 Then came the overtime and some more heroics from the Weber Boys as Dick Weber was right in position to deflect a wide shot from the blueline past a helpless Devlin. Assist went to Kevin Healy and, of course, Mrs. Joan Dickson, president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, is in charge of catering for the players. She is assisted by 12 other women.
 "It's a community affair," Mrs. Dickson said. "We want to make sure they get home cooked meals and roast beef is the most popular."
 Outside the Richmond Hill Arena the parking lot is jammed most of the day. Controlling the parking are members of the Air Cadets, Squadron 778. They use walkie-talkies hooked into the tournament control room to keep track of empty spaces.
