Staff Of 40 Planned For Vaughan Summer Recreation Program

Vaughan Town Council has authorized hiring of 40 people at a cost of \$24,975 as managers, supervisors, guards, instructors, leaders and related staff for summer recreation programs in the municipality.

At a meeting March 6 council was told that 21 part-time staff will be needed for operation of Thornhill Pool during the coming summer. This would include two assistant managers, 10 instructor-guards, three maintenance crews, four counter checkers, a tuckshop operator and a part-time cashier. Cost was estimated at

about \$16,000. For playground programs in six locations to operate for seven weeks 13 leaders will be required for seven weeks and one supervisor for 13 weeks. Salaries for this staff is estimated at \$5,590.

Also planned for the summer are youth involvement centres to operate for nine weeks in two locations. Staff proposed would consist of one supervisor and four leaders at a cost of

Asked if the municipality can expect to make any money from this project, Industrial Commissioner James McDonald said that if it is a hot summer they will make money on the pool. If it is a cold summer they can expect to lose money.

Only 28% Voted W'dbridge Liquor

Liquor lounges did not do as well. Voting in favor were 240 residents and against 222, giving a percentage of 51.95%.

In May 1962 when the same two questions were put to the populace of the former village. 68% of the eligible voters turned out at the voting places. The result of the vote was soundly opposed to the serving of liquor


