APRICOT PARFAIT PIE 1 baked 8-inch pie shell, cooled 1 pkg. orange jelly 1 1/4 cups hot canned, apricot juice 1 pt. vanilla ice cream

Dissolve jelly in hot juice. Add ice cream by spoonfuls, stirring until melted. Chill until thickened but not set, about 15 or 20 minutes. Turn into cooled baked pie shell. Chill until firm. Garnish with whipped cream and shaved chocolate. Mrs. A. Hergert.
