The brief describes procedures used in the State of New York and by the Central Electricity Generating Board in the United Kingdom where public enquiry is standard procedure for major transmission lines.

The coalition charge that the proposed transmission line design is wasteful, outdated, and ignores recognized good practice as set out by the United States Federal Power Commission.




