Richmond Hill Man Manages New Plant

John Lohman, who lives at 192 Bayview Avenue, Richmond Hill, is manager of Toronto Roof Truss Limited which is building a manufacturing plant on the Aurora Sideroad, just east of Don Mills Road. The building is now up, finishing is progressing well and machinery will be installed shortly with the official opening scheduled for mid-May.

The plant will manufacture wooden roof trusses which are held together and reinforced by a steel connector plate, called a gang-nail, inserted by a hydraulic press. It will prefabricate every type of roof, doing all the engineering and fabricating for residential, farm, commercial, industrial and agricultural roof truss systems, a more economical method of framing a roof than on the job.

The company will employ 12 to 15 local people when operations begin and will be hiring in three to four weeks. It is expected that by next year the number of employees will be doubled as the plant will introduce a two-shift day. A third shift may be added later.

Mr. Lohman, with 12 years in the business, is the most experienced gang-nail man in Canada.

Express Yourself At Seneca College

Part time daytime and evening courses in batik, self-expression, family camping, picnic cooking start this month at Seneca College's King Campus. There will be a series of study sessions dealing with "Future Shock" as well.

The college is also sponsoring "Worlds of Women" programs in Markham.

Batik is the Indonesian art of drawing a design on fabric with hot wax and then coloring the fabric with dyes. Instructor Erica Wilson who teaches batik in North York will show participants in the course how to design wall hangings, dresses, lengths, scarves, ties, pillow covers. Classes take place at the college on Dufferin Street from 1:30 to 3:30 pm each Thursday beginning April 13 and continuing to June 1.

A variety of media—pencil, charcoal, inks, pastels, acrylics and oils—will help students find new abilities and skills in the program "Express Yourself" on Tuesday afternoons from April 11 to June 13. Graphic Designer Judy Grady, a teacher of creative painting, will give guidance in developing balance, rhythm and form to assist participants in increasing capacity for self-awareness and self-expression.

A 12-hour program Wednesday evenings from April 19 to May 31 is intended to acquaint the family with the fun of the outdoors in classes on family camping.

Sessions will include camping in Ontario's parks, safety while camping, preparing and cooking food, water safety, healthy camping and what an organized camping club has to offer. A barbecue is planned for the final evening and the \$7 fee covers the whole family. Questions raised by Alvin Toffler's book, "Future Shock" concerning the future and how to cope with it will provide the basis for eight sessions 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. April 12 to May 31.

Instructor Irene Fink, a graduate social worker and family life counsellor will pose the questions, "What happens to people overwhelmed by change?" "How will we adapt, or fail to adapt, to the future?"

The course in patio cooking will be an indoor-outdoor program 7:30 to 9:30 pm Tuesdays April 11 to May 30. Directed by Chef Williams Stevens, classroom sessions will include choosing equipment and fire safety, selecting and marinating meat, poultry and fish. These will be followed by two outdoor practice sessions when students will be taken step by step from building the fire to serving the food. Markham Arena is headquarters for the "Worlds of Women" course Thursdays 9:15 to 11:45 am April 6 to June 8. This program aims to assist women of all ages and backgrounds to gain knowledge, confidence and awareness of themselves and the world around them, says the Seneca information bulletin.

Co-ordinator Irma Melville will attempt to help the participants understand more fully their services available to them in 1972 regarding continuing education, employment opportunities and community services. There will be group discussion and interaction, field trips to places of interest and guest speakers.

Registration fees for the various programs range from \$7 to \$25. For information call 884-9901 or Zenith 31200 (toll free from most locations in York Region).

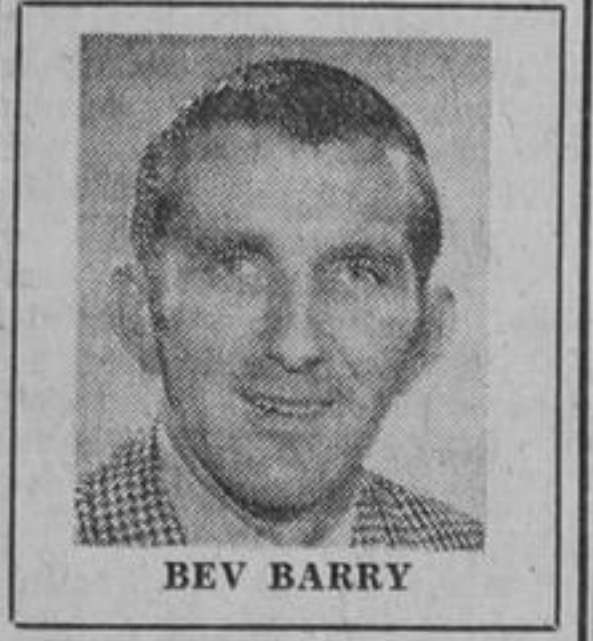
