Community School Use Cost Here Within Provincial Budget Ceiling

Department of Education ceilings on school board spending will not affect the York County Board of Education's policy regarding community use of schools.

At a meeting March 27, trustees agreed costs related to community use of schools would remain as an item in its normal operational budget. According to board policy, most of these costs are recovered from the user groups through the various municipal recreation committees that sponsor them.

The question arose when the board received a memorandum from Education Minister Thomas Wells announcing that costs related to community use of schools did not have to be included in expenditure ceilings imposed by the province. Such expenses could be classified as extraordinary expenditures.

COULD LOSE GRANTS
The step had been taken, Wells wrote, to ensure full access to and use of school facilities by the general community. There is, however, no provincial grant payable on such costs. Operational grants to York County are slightly over 60 per cent.

The York County budget for 1972 is below the provincial ceiling. If costs associated with community use of schools were moved outside the ceilings it would simply mean grants would be lost.

A board staff report said the Wells' announcement was to assist boards that are having difficulties in meeting the ceilings.

"It is essentially a way of letting the Metro boards get beneath their ceilings," explained Education Director Sam Chapman. "There are no extraordinary grants for extraordinary expenses. It would be a disadvantage for us to take advantage of this."

"Many boards have been spending a great deal of money on community projects for which grants were eligible," said Markham Trustee Louise Aimore of Thornhill. "The ceilings have made them aware of this. They have been absorbing the costs into their education budgets, but thanks to the diligence of our board, this has not happened before here."

Grants are available to recreation committees for recreation purposes but these grants are not available to school boards.

Three From Gormley Hospitalized Thornhill Car Careens Off Yonge

Several people are recovering from injuries received in local accidents last week while police are looking for a driver who parked away after hitting two parked cars early Sunday morning on Bayview Avenue North.

Seriously injured Sunday after a 1 pm crash on Gormley Sideroad 1/4-mile west of Concession 3 was Sarah Hoover, 35, of Lot 35, Concession 2, RR 2 Gormley.

Also suffering cuts and bruises were Rosanne Hoover, 12, and LeeAnne Hoover aged 2, according to Richmond Hill Division YRP. The Hoovers were treated at York Central Hospital and the car had an estimated \$600 damage.

Mrs. Hoover and children were due to return home from hospital Wednesday. Mrs. Hoover had a broken left arm and nasty cuts to the forehead.

The driver of the other car in the accident was Kenneth Owen, 29, of 41 Connaught Avenue, Willowdale. He had an estimated \$350 damage, according to YRP.

Cuts bruises and back strain were suffered by one driver at 5:10 pm Monday in a rather spectacular rush hour accident at Yonge Street and Benson Avenue.

Hurt was Robert Duncan, 56, of 170 Dudley Avenue, Thornhill. His 1966 Chrysler suffered about \$1,000 damage when it mounted the sidewalk, knocked down sign, crossed a Shell Service Station lot, crossed Benson Avenue, and entered the Gulf Service Station lot knocking a trailer into a car before coming to rest.

The parked trailer belonged to Caravan Trailer Rental Company, 949 Dixie Road, Rexdale and had about \$800 damage. The other vacant parked car was a 1971 Pontiac owned by Beverly Cook, 213 Newton Drive, Willowdale. It had an estimated \$600 damage.

Luckily no pedestrians were hurt. A police spokesman said at press time the investigation wasn't complete and cause of the accident wasn't determined.

Police at press time were looking for the driver of a car that hit two parked cars at 1:35 am Sunday on Bayview Avenue south of the Bethesda Sideroad in northern Richmond Hill. The driver apparently ran away across the fields.

His car was registered to Charles Brash of Lot 30 Concession 9, in the Kleinburg area of Vaughan Town. It was a 1963 Chevrolet pickup truck and suffered about \$600 damage, according to YRP.

There was about \$900 damage to the parked 1967 blue Meteor owned by Allan Middleton of Bayview Avenue, Lake Wilcox.

The third car was also parked and was a 1964 Plymouth belonging to David Neil of 8 Wilcox Road, Oak Ridges. Police estimated damage to it at \$100.
