Library

Horticultural Society

The regular monthly meeting of the Thornhill and Area Horticultural Society is scheduled for April 18 at 8 p.m. at the North Thornhill Recreational Centre, Royal Orchard Boulevard and Baythorn Drive. The speaker for the evening will be Jeffrey Mains, a biochemist with Pollution Probe who will speak on pollution in horticulture and agriculture. The first flower show of the year will be held, featuring house plants, flowering shrubs (forced) and decorative designs. Other items of interest will be plant sale, draw prizes, and refreshments. Visitors are most welcome.

Behavior Therapy Foundation

The Behavior Therapy Foundation has opened its office at Suite 31, 5385 Yonge Street, Willowdale, and is already attracting interest. Are you as much in the dark as I was? Ray Segee, consultant and instructor for the foundation, explained its purpose (in the sense of alleviation of disorder) through communication. Due to the multiplicity of impulses and sensations in the kind of world we live in today, we build up tensions, frustrations, a feeling of inadequacy, and confusion. But if we are able to clarify our ideas and express them to each other, and take time to listen to each other, there is release.

In weekly classes, small and friendly groups, Mr. Segee teaches and discusses techniques which enable persons to communicate. Once shown methods and made aware of what is happening to all of us, the students must practise 'communication'.

I was invited to attend one such class, and found that a very interesting experience. A very pleasant, easy climate was provided by the personality of Ray Segee. People were welcomed as they arrived, and made to feel at home. There was a give and take in conversation. One housewife confided that her 17-year-old son had told her he thought the three classes she had attended had helped her; she was calmer and more aware of what was going on. She was very pleased. Everybody participated in the discussion which followed.

Relaxing exercises are also taught, using natural body movements. The classes last about two hours, and there are seven, one per week.

Ray Segee is a maritimer. He graduated from the University of New Brunswick in psychology and took post graduate work in philosophy and social psychology. Then he worked in industry as a personnel manager. Next he became a communications consultant and began to give courses. These proved themselves by the changes they made in the lives of the students.

Last January the Behavior Therapy Foundation (a non-profit organization) was formed and Mr. Segee became a staff member. Leon Shelly is business manager, and there is a board of directors.

People enrolling in the classes come from all walks of life: business men, teachers, housewives, church visitors, etc. There is a great satisfaction in practising 'communication' and discovering that it works!

Mothers' Break

"Mothers' Break", a new community program for mothers and young children, was started at the United Church April 4. First the children were settled, divided on the basis of age and activities; babies were looked after by Mrs. Tom Dix and Mrs. Ada McNeil; toddlers by Mrs. Olive Harrington and Mrs. Sheila Morrow, pre-schoolers are guided in their activities by Mrs. Carol Greer with two mothers who volunteer each week.

After a strenuous half hour of exercises led by physical education specialist, Mrs. Ann Crandell, the mothers sat down for their first discussion group to hear about the recreation scene in Thornhill.

Markham Recreation Director Bruce Holdsworth announced the good news that the indoor swimming pool to be built in Thornlea Secondary is scheduled to open January 1973. A

community are being planned. There was also a possibility that an arena might be constructed in co-operation with the Thornhill Lions and the Thornhill Recreation Association, but there are difficulties with this project.

Mr. Holdsworth outlined other program: the "After-4" for children 6-11 at the United Church; and the football, hockey and soccer leagues. The mothers were interested to hear of the summer day camps for children 7-11, and 11-13. The children are bused to a park near Highway 48 for outdoor fun. There may also be a half-day program for younger children age 4-9. More information can be obtained through the Markham Recreation Office.

A major interest concerned the location of the parks, since the developers always show numerous sites in new areas. Mr. Holdsworth spoke of three parks that are being worked on this year. Work on the Shields Snow Park (Bayview Lane) will start this year at a cost of \$148,000. Grandview Park on Doncaster Avenue will be improved and Duncan Park off John Street will also begin this year. He pointed out that the high cost of equipment: for example, Normark Park has \$5,000 worth of equipment but it looks insignificant. One of the mothers suggested more creative equipment, and this is being considered but this is expensive.

Everybody was agast to learn that of 43 parks in the Town of Markham this area has only three!

Every member of the group of mothers, all who have young children, were concerned about the lack of facilities for the preschool age child. Although there is a "tot lot" behind Heintzman House, there doesn't seem to be any way to keep the grounds clean, and no supervision is being planned for this summer. A wading pool is scheduled for the Shields Snow Park in the future, but there are no plans for a wading pool anywhere else.

President Glen Rae of the Thornhill Recreational Association, pointed out that the outdoor pool, traditionally run by the TRA, is being run by the Town of Vaughan this year. The pool will be open on weekends in June, with lessons for children age four and over beginning at the end of the school term. The mothers were most interested to learn that a new program for mothers and young children will be held all summer. Water safety and life-saving courses for mothers will be held during June. Information about the pool program will be distributed about the first of May with registration by May 24.

Mr. Rae mentioned other activities co-ordinated by the TRA, such as Tennis Club, Aquatic Club, skiing for juniors at Uplands, men's football, and table tennis. The Thornhill park beside the pool has good facilities, with equipment supplied by the Thornhill Lions.

The ladies were concerned about the information gap in this area. Material about programs is often sent home with the school children, and families

with no children or pre-schoolers don't get the information. Mr. Rae said that the pool flyer would be distributed to every household in May as would the pamphlet being printed in co-operation with the Town of Markham in September.

The recreation association is always in need of more people to help with local programs and Mr. Rae emphasized that all help would be greatly appreciated.

Ed Bodaert of the North Thornhill Recreation Association, was unable to attend at the last minute, but sent information about new programs that started last fall, such as drama for boys and girls ages 6-12, soccer for boys and girls ages 7 and up, and karate for men and women, boys and girls.

Mrs. Gwen Halliday, program director for the Richmond Hill and District YWCA was given a special welcome, since the idea for the "Mothers' Break" program started at the "Y". Although lack of finances prevented it from being a Y-Church project, the mothers took the lead in developing the program anyway, with Gwen as a consultant.

Gwen explained that because there is no United Appeal in this area, the "Y" is limited in program and staff; however a number of very good programs are offered, such as "mothers' holiday", craft classes, (with all daytime activities providing babysitting for 50c per family). Of special interest is the preschool swimming classes for mothers and children age 2-6 in the covered Centennial Pool, Richmond Hill. Day camp sessions for children 8-14 are held at the Mill Pond.

A gym program for mothers and pre-schoolers is planned for fall.

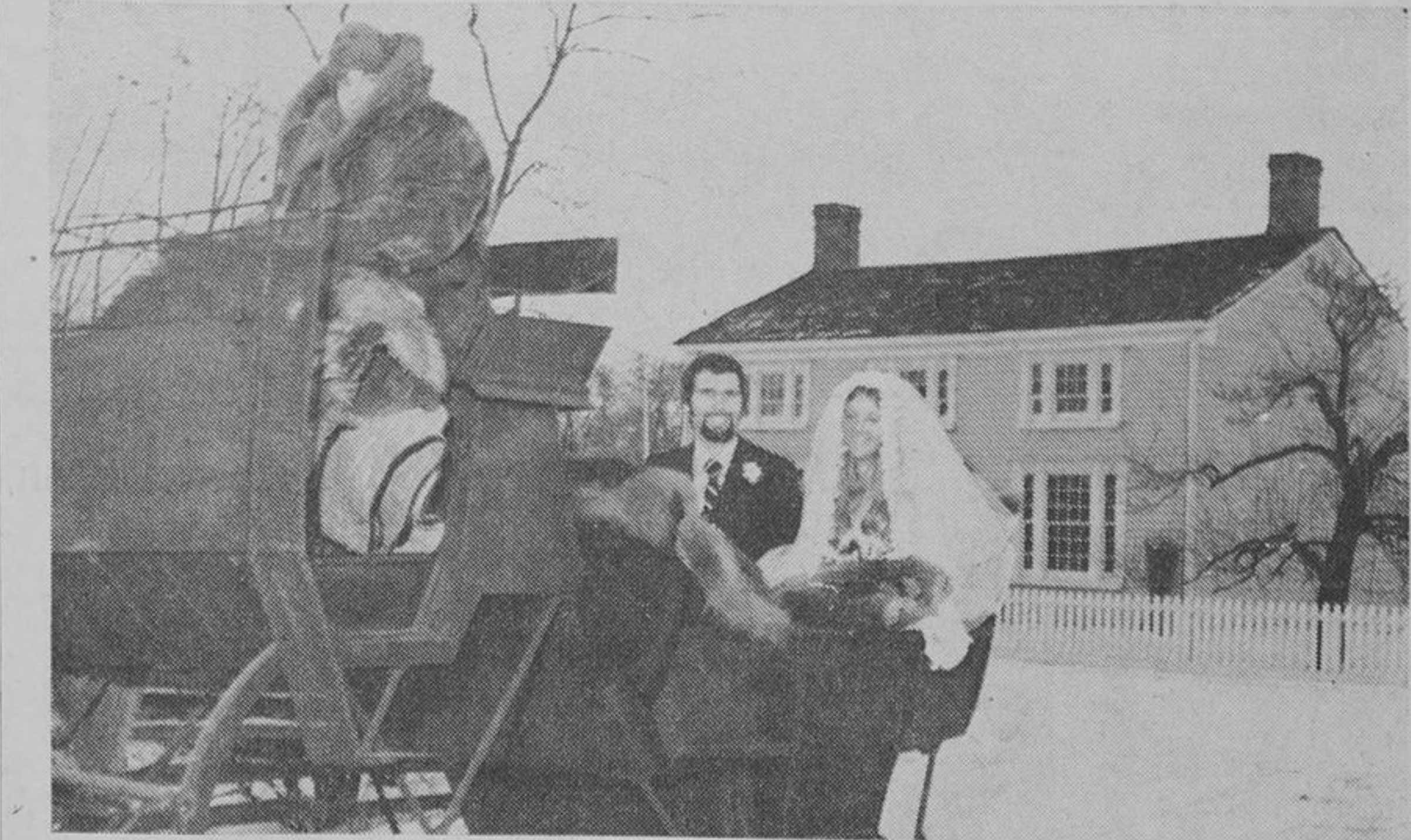

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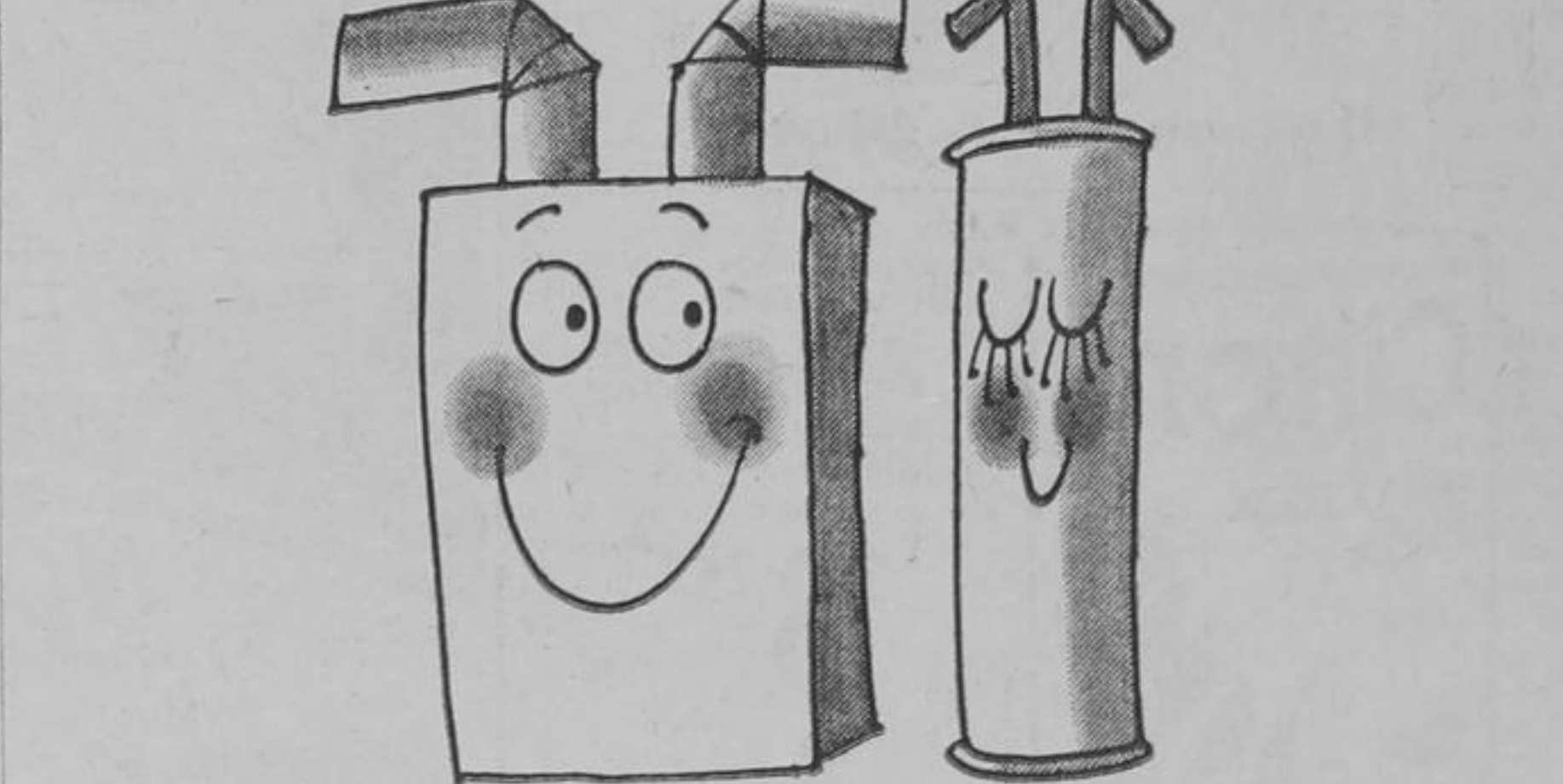
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
