It was on Thursday afternoon of last week that squads of provincial and York Regional police descended on a private dump near Maple after striking Metro garbage men and dump employees began brawling along a picket line. Edward Savace, 36, a member of Local 43, Canadian Union of Public Employees, fell under one of the dump firm's trucks as it crawled through angry pickets with a load of trash from Toronto. He was treated in hospital for leg injuries. Police had to protect the driver from the pickets. He was taken through the line in a squad car in company with three detectives. No charges have been laid. The dump and a fleet of 100 trucks belong to Disposal Services Limited, a firm owned by Max Solomon and Norman Goodhead. Goodhead is a former North York reeve said to be a candidate for the Metro chairman's job. Inspector Wally Harkness of York Regional Police said the confrontation Thursday was a simple case of management and labor not understanding the ground rules of a strike. "We just went out and cooled them down," he said. He said about 60 or 70 police were involved. "It was a fair show of force, but we were responding to some citizens' alarm. When we got out there we weren't all needed," said the YRP inspector. Disposal Services has contracts to remove garbage from Metro apartment developments owned by Cadillac Property Management, Greenwin and Meridian Property Management.
