Cadillac Lumber & Building, located on the old station property in Maple, met at the March 7 meeting with Vaughan Council's Planning Committee and requested an amendment to Bylaw Number 2523 (the town's zoning bylaw). This amendment would zone part of Lot 21, Concession 3 to M2 to permit general industrial use including outdoor storage, the same use (Photo by Stuart's Studio) that has been carried out on the site since 1956.

Council accepted the application and approved the necessary amending bylaw April 17. It was reported that there had been some question as to whether the property was zoned for the purpose for which it was being used. In fact there was a question as to whether it had been zoned at all. The amending bylaw legalizes the existing use and is in keeping with the general use of the surrounding area.


