Developer Wants Woodbridge School Named For Civic Leader

An early civic leader of the Woodbridge area may be immortalized in the name of a school.

At a meeting April 10, York County Board of Education received a letter from Wallace

Beaton suggesting the name "Clarke Wallace Public School" as the name for an elementary school that will be needed to serve the Beaton Subdivision proposed for the Town of Vaughan just north of Woodbridge.

According to information in the letter, Nathaniel Clarke Wallace was born in Woodbridge in 1844 and served as a teacher at SS 13 Vaughan (Lower Ninth) from 1864 to 1868 and was responsible for establishing continuation classes at Woodbridge Public School in 1895.

Wallace was deputy-reeve of Vaughan for four years and was warden of York County in 1878. He represented the area in the House of Commons at Ottawa for 23 years and was Minister of Customs from 1891 to 1895.

The board was informed that four grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren live in Woodbridge and vicinity, and the daughter-in-law of Mr. Wallace, Mrs. Clarke Wallace, still lives on Mounsey Street in Woodbridge.

Trustees agreed that the suggestion should be passed on to the Users' Committee which will be set up to help design the school.

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Wilfred Lawson Dies

Wilfred (Bill) Lawson, former owner of Vaughan Acres Farm, one of those productive farms which have become the CNR Marshalling Yard south of Maple, passed away April 16. He was 74 years of age.

Mr. Lawson built up a herd of Jerseys and was a top breeder in his field for many years, exhibiting them in competition over a wide area. Their fame became worldwide and members of the herd were shipped throughout the world, the most notable shipment being to Cuba shortly after Fidel Castro came to power.

Mr. Lawson was also a mining executive having interests in the Kirkland Lake district.

He was born in Hobart and raised in Toronto, being a boyhood chum and fellow paper boy with financier George McCullough, who went on to be owner and publisher of the Globe & Mail which he had delivered as a boy.

Prior to World War II Mr. Lawson moved to Vaughan Acres Farm and devoted his not inconsiderable energy to the development of a top Jersey herd.

He is survived by his wife, Estelle Lawson, daughter, Carol and son John Ross, of Thornhill.

The funeral was held at 10 am on April 19 from Rosar Funeral Home, Sherbourne Street, Toronto.

Dump Issue Proceeds

At the general meeting of the Kleinburg and Area Ratepayers held April 11, Ron MacDonald reported on the sanitary landfill operation proposed for the Concession 3 on Highway 27. The legal firm of McCarthy and McCarthy, retained by the ratepayers, believes that the examinations for discovery have gone in their favor and the matter will now proceed to trial, it was reported. Mr. MacDonald appealed for more funds to cover these additional costs.

Vote in Development

Tuesday, April 11, saw an excellent turnout of interested citizens to hear representatives from the Ontario Regional Development Branch present plans for areas involved in the "Design For Development of the Toronto-Centred Region."

Sam Clasky, director of treasury and economics for the ORD explained that an area within a radius of 90 miles from Lake Ontario and containing 8,600 square miles is divided into three zones. Zone 1 reaches from Hamilton to Oshawa, projecting 10 to 15 miles inland from the lake. Zone 2, a "Commuter Shed" includes Kleinburg. Zone 3 is a peripheral ring taking in Barrie, Midland, Port Hope and Cobourg.

Zone 2, with a present population of 180,000 and will be used for recreation, conservation and agriculture.

Richardson Hill, Aurora and Newmarket will be the axis connecting Zone 1 with the cities to the north in Zone 3. His talk was effectively pictured by colored slides (with Highway 407 still being shown south of Woodbridge).

Pierre Berton asked where we might expect the additional population to be located. Mr. Clasky replied that the province is waiting for the Town of Vaughan and the Region of York to present a proposal for population distribution.

It was then asked to what extent the people would be heard. The answer was that there will be a public meeting to hear the wishes of the people.

Cadillac Lumber Use Legalized By Vaughan

Cadillac Lumber & Building, located on the old station property in Maple, met at the March 7 meeting with Vaughan Council's Planning Committee and requested an amendment to By-law Number 2523 (the town's zoning bylaw). This amendment would zone part of Lot 21, Concession 3 to M2 to permit general industrial use including outdoor storage, the same use that has been carried out on the site since 1956.

Council accepted the application and approved the necessary amending bylaw April 17.

It was reported that there had been some question as to whether the property was zoned for the purpose for which it was being used. In fact there was a question as to whether it had been zoned at all. The amending bylaw legalizes the existing use and is in keeping with the general use of the surrounding area.
