Community Life In King City Area

Good Morning Group

A very enjoyable meeting of members and guests was held June 7 with guest speaker Ann Wilson of Kingross giving a talk on "Flower Arranging". She began by giving an abbreviated history of the art and explained that it began in ancient times as a priest during a famine used a bouquet of flowers to fill up the spaces on the altar of the gods. It began in Ancient China and moved into Japan, then to Russia, and Egypt where it was simple and stylized and used much fruit, on to Rome and Greece where grapes were used in arrangements, Germany, Spain and eventually England. Floral arrangements appeared in the wake of the conquering armies. The art was lost during the Middle and Dark Ages for about 400 years and reappeared again in the herbs used by the Egyptians.

It was picked in the early morning, before the strong sun is upon them, on the day before you plan to use them. Place them in cold water up to their heads, and refrigerate. Woody stems should be smashed with a hammer. Tulips should have a pin hole just below the flower head and rolled in newspaper before placing them in the water. She emphasized that "there is no such thing as a weed". In one arrangement she used the flowering seed tip of a rhubarb plant. Mrs. Wilson recommended a booklet entitled "Snippy Tips" available for 50c from the Civic Garden Centre, 777 Lawrence Avenue East, Toronto. She went on to do three more arrangements, one of which was a mass floral arrangement using lilies, tulips and day lilies. From Commercial To Residential

144 Oppose Ridges' Zoning Change

Henry Natale and David Smith brought a petition bearing 144 signatures to Richmond Hill Town Council at its June 5 meeting, protesting a proposed rezoning of land on the King Sideroad from commercial to residential.

Mr. Smith pointed out that since the King Sideroad does not extend eastward from Yonge Street, the T-shape of the community is especially conducive to commercial development along the sideroad. "We don't see that this zoning downgrades the area at all. In time to come this land may be needed for commercial development. We intend to develop it commercially and have been waiting till the right time comes along. To have it taken away just doesn't seem right."

The proposed rezoning came about because of a petition from 34 Oak Ridges residents, who protested the commercial zoning on one parcel of land. To avoid the undesirable effects of spot zoning, council's planning committee decided that the rezoning should extend from Bostwick Crescent-Schomberg Road to the western limit of the commercial zone on the King Sideroad.

He asked that Bylaw 1275 of King Township be left pretty much as it is. He stated his group had an alternative suggestion to make which could satisfy both groups of petitioners and asked that the matter be referred back to the planning committee.

Research by Planning Director Hesse Rimon had revealed that in a zoning bylaw passed by King Township in 1962 the area had been designated commercial. However, in the township's Official Plan approved in 1970, the designation had been changed to "urban centre". The plan reads, "The Urban Centre classification of lands means that the predominant use of the land in the areas so designated shall be for residential uses developed on the basis of a municipal water supply. Uses permitted shall be limited to single family dwellings, home occupation uses, places of worship, schools and parks."
