Summer Camping

There are still openings for both boys and girls in the unique summer camp program being offered this year by the Metro Conservation Authority.
 Held at the Albion Hills and Clearmont Conservation Field Centres, the camp program involves a wide variety of interesting field trips which show man's interaction with his natural environment and his dependence on it.
 And while learning something about conservation, the youngsters also have a lot of fun. Recreational activities at the camp include instruction in such leisure skills as archery, hunter safety, riflery, photography, astronomy and others. As well, the youngsters can enjoy swimming, hiking, campfire nights, cookouts, canoeing and fishing.
 Separate times and programs are offered for girls and boys, and qualified staff are in charge of all activities. Students who have completed any of grades 6 to 10 are eligible for the camp, with groups of 40 being accepted on a first come, first taken basis.
 The camp for boys is at the Clearmont Field Centre, running from July 17 to 21 at a cost of \$45 per student.
 The girls' program lasts for 12 days at the Albion Hills Field Centres and runs from July 31 to August 11 at a cost of \$108. Students sleep in dormitories at the centre, with two to four youngsters sharing a room.
 Some of the areas of interest with which the students will be actively involved during the camp include water conservation, which covers stream management and flood control; plant life, including forestry and botany, our weather and climate, including the use of measuring instruments and recording devices; and farms, including soils, animals and chores involved on a farm.

Richmond Hill Athletes Do Well In Three Weekend Track Meets

A full slate of activities for all tastes was provided Dominion Day Weekend with three separate track meets in the Metro area.
 Thursday evening the Newmarket Club held a mini-meet which was well attended by the Richmond Hill members who were most prominent in the winners' circle.
 Glen Belcher, a hard-training long jumper upset speedy John Santos in the 100 meters — and to gain revenge, young Santos upset Glen in the bantam long jump.
 Darlene Christie and Steve Price seemed to be perennial runners-up in the under 11 sprints and longer distances, while Doug Workman had it all his own way in the midget 100 meters and long jump.
 The evening was interrupted constantly by rain and the meet was terminated early. To make up for this early closing the Richmond Hill Athletic Club will invite Newmarket, Tottenham and Victoria Park to a twilight meet in July.
AT OSHAWA
 Dominion Day the junior championships for Central Ontario were held. Richmond Hill entered six eager athletes and three of them won recognition which will make them eligible for the Ontario finals in Kitchener July 29.
 Ironman Greg Binkley entered the 100 meter hurdles, the 400 meter hurdles, the 800 meters, the mile run and the 400 meters. A second place medal in the 400 meter hurdles and a fourth place finish in the 100 meter hurdles were more than enough to send Greg on to Kitchener later this month.
 Cathie Clark, the club's 400 meter expert, won a third place medal in the women's 400 meters to also gain a berth down Kitchener way.

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Hill Rink Wins Gold Cup Second Time In 40 Years

Back in 1932 a Richmond Hill Rink of lawn bowlers won the Hanna Gold Cup at the Boulevard Club in Toronto. This rink was composed of Jim McLean, E. T. Stephens, Art Eden and A. E. Glass.
 It took 40 years, but last Saturday at the Boulevard Club a Richmond Hill rink, composed of Duncan Smith, Larry Wales and James Grainger repeated the feat and came home with the same trophy, being the winners of the club's invitational Mr. Boulevard Day.
 Wednesday, June 28, in the local club's ladies' gala and invitational day, a full quota of entries competed with Oshawa rinks taking all but the top prize of the

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
