Why not join the happy bingo crowd each week—you never know your luck!



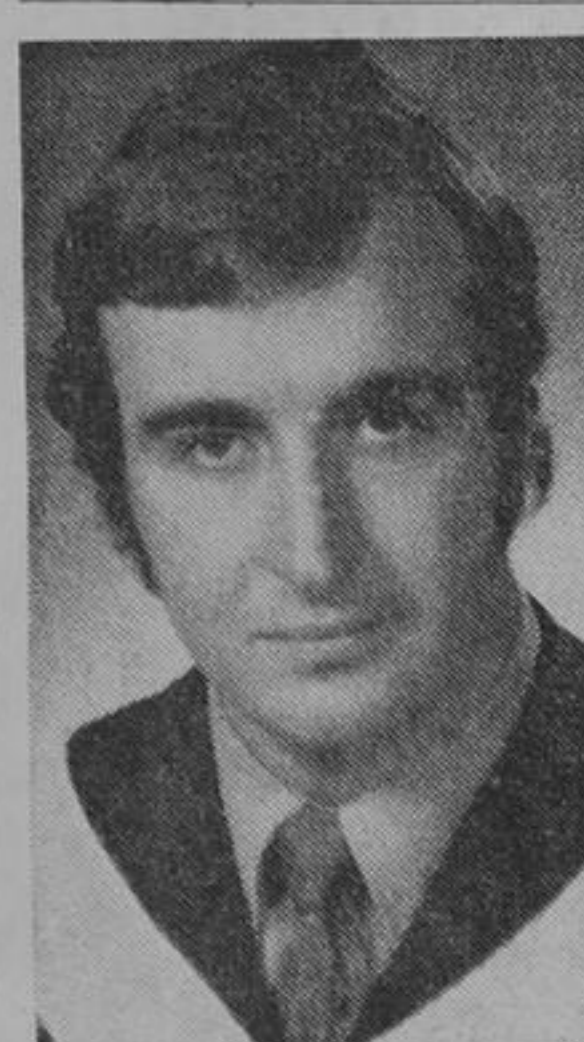
SALLY MANNING

BEEF GELATIN

1 pkg. lemon gelatin
1 cup boiling water
3/4 cup beet juice
3 tbs. vinegar
1/2 tsp. salt
2 tsp. onion juice or grated onion
1 tbs. horseradish
3/4 cup celery, diced
1 cup cooked, beets, diced

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add beet juice, vinegar, salt, onion juice and horseradish. Chill. When slightly thickened, fold in celery and beets. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold on crisp lettuce.

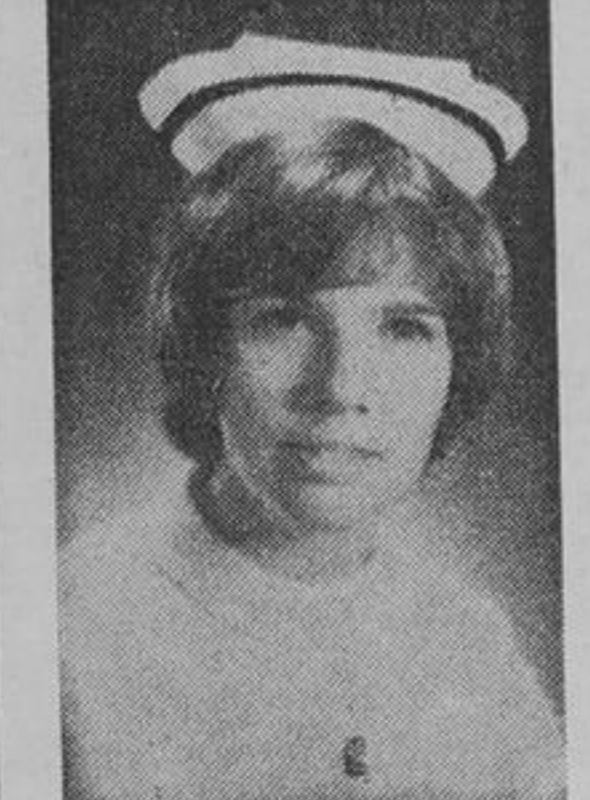
