### More Serious Than Marijuana

## R. Hill Man Finds Hashish Costly

Being in possession of about \$20 worth of hashish cost a Richmond Hill man \$150 in Richmond Hill Provincial Court Thursday of last week.

Judge Russell Pearce also put Edward Claudio of Neal Drive on probation for two years, when he convicted him on the possession charge.

Claudio was charged after York Regional Police Officer F. Stojanovic had stopped him on another matter May 25. A search of his clothing revealed two large pieces of the drug and several smaller pieces.

A certificate of analysis presented to the court, showed 10.1 grams of the drug. In handing down sentence, Judge Pearce said he was treating the hashish offence more severely than he would have one dealing with marijuana.

Driving their cars while their ability was impaired by alcohol, resulted in \$150 fines and varying license suspensions for four men.

Heaviest suspensions were handed out to Richard Wilson, 20, of Lougheed Drive, Newmarket, and Frederick Ellis of Downsview, both of whom will have to find other means of transportation for the next six months.

According to the police report, Wilson, who pleaded guilty, drove his car at 75 miles an hour down Newkirk Road in Richmond Hill just after midnight June 23, and wound up in a ditch.

A subsequent breathalyzer test revealed 150 mgs. of alcohol in his blood content. A reading of 80 mgs. is sufficient to indicate impairment.

Judge Pearce said there were too many people being killed by drinking drivers, and the best way to deal with it, was to take

away the latters' licence to as stated in common law going back to 1640, of putting the two accused on a \$100 bond to keep the peace for a year.

Mr. Ellis was charged after he struck a parked car with his vehicles after leaving a parking lot in Woodbridge July 5, and kept on going.

He was later stopped by police. A subsequent breathalyzer test showed 200 mgs.

In dismissing the assault charge against Martin Turner, 19, of Hawkridge Street, Markham, Judge Pearce said he didn't think that what transpired between the accused and the complainant, Paul Gilham of Markham, was serious enough to indicate assault.

Mr. Gilham, a postman, told the court he had yelled at the accused to watch his driving after the latter had cut him off at an intersection in Markham April 25.

He said Turner got out of his car and yelled back at him, and when the complainant tried to write down his licence number, Turner grabbed his pen from him.

He then gave the pen back when asked to, but not before grabbing him by the shoulder, Mr. Gilham said.

The complainant then reported the matter to the police. Turner said he gave the postman his name, but asked him not to take the licence number, as the car didn't belong to him.

He denied grabbing the complainant at any time.

Police Constable Richard Pike, the two were fighting on the lot June 15, with Ronald on the bottom and his brother on top. The former received a black eye in the scuffle, the constable said.

In their testimony, the brothers said they were "just horsing around," and Ronald's sore eye was the result of his being pushed onto his brother's outstretched elbow by another member of their group.

Judge Pearce said the charge of causing a disturbance wasn't

## Court NEWS

James Ryan, Norton Avenue, Willowdale, who refused to take a breathalyzer test when charged July 5, received a three-month suspension of his licence along with his fine.

Police said that Ryan, who pleaded guilty, was picked up by police after weaving slightly along the centre line of Yonge Street South in his car at 65 mph about 1:40 am.

A similar suspension was handed down to Frederick Morton of Kingston Road, Scarborough, who police said was driving in an impaired manner on Jane Street March 30 around 1:30 am.

Although police reported a breathalyzer reading of 160 mgs., the accused said it was 140.

Judge Pearce gave the benefit of the doubt to the accused in dismissing two other cases, one of causing a disturbance and the other of common assault.

However, in the case of two brothers, Ronald, 20, and William, 26, Rolling of Maple, who appeared on the disturbance charge, Judge Pearce said he would exercise his prerogative
