EGGPLANT AND CORN IN CASSEROLE

- 1 large onion, sliced thin
4 tbsp. olive oil
1 garlic clove, minced
3 large tomatoes (fresh or canned)
salt and cayenne
pepper
1 young eggplant
flour
1/2 cup milk
2 cups canned corn (cream style)
1 tbsp. melted butter
2 eggs, separated
Slowly fry onion in 2 table-spoons olive oil until golden; add garlic and continue slow frying until garlic is lightly browned; cut tomatoes and add; season with salt and cayenne, and simmer until sauce thickens.

Meanwhile, peel eggplant, cut in thick fingers and drop into salted and peppered flour. Heat remaining olive oil and fry eggplant until browned on all sides, mix with sauce and put in buttered baking dish. Mix corn, milk, butter and beaten egg yolks; fold in stiffly beaten egg whites; and spread mixture over eggplant. Set dish uncovered in moderate oven and bake 25 - 30 minutes, or until corn mixture is tenderly firmed and lightly browned.
