It would be much appreciated if the person who has enjoyed them now for several days would return them for other people to continue enjoying them in their proper setting.

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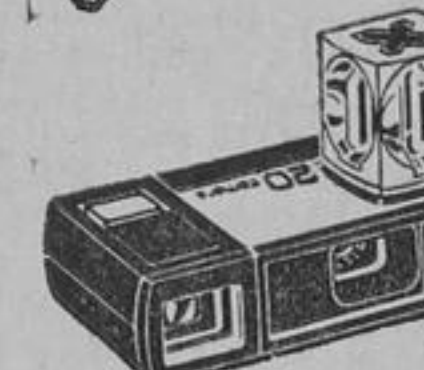
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
