The course, to be held from 8 to 10:30 pm every Monday for 12 weeks commencing September 11 through November 27, will include choosing the play, property plot, music, sound effects, planning rehearsal schedules, casting, analyzing the play—finding an approach, blocking the play, handling crowd scenes, rehearsals—what to expect and what to aim for, from read-through to dress rehearsals, style and its many meanings in the theatre.

Sessions will all be very practical with a minimum of lecturing per session.

Ron Hartman, a familiar and respected professional in the Central Ontario Region, is currently the artistic director of the Ontario Youth Theatre, summer company '72. He has directed at the National Theatre School, the University of Toronto, University of Waterloo and Lambton Community College.

WALNUT SQUARES

1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup granulated sugar
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1/2 tsp salt
2 cups brown sugar
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup chopped nuts
Cream butter and granulated sugar. Add well-beaten egg yolks. Blend well. Add flour. Grease and flour a shallow pan. Press this mixture in pan firmly. Beat egg whites until stiff. Add salt, brown sugar, vanilla and nuts. Spread over mixture in pan. Bake in slow pan (275 degrees) until light brown.
