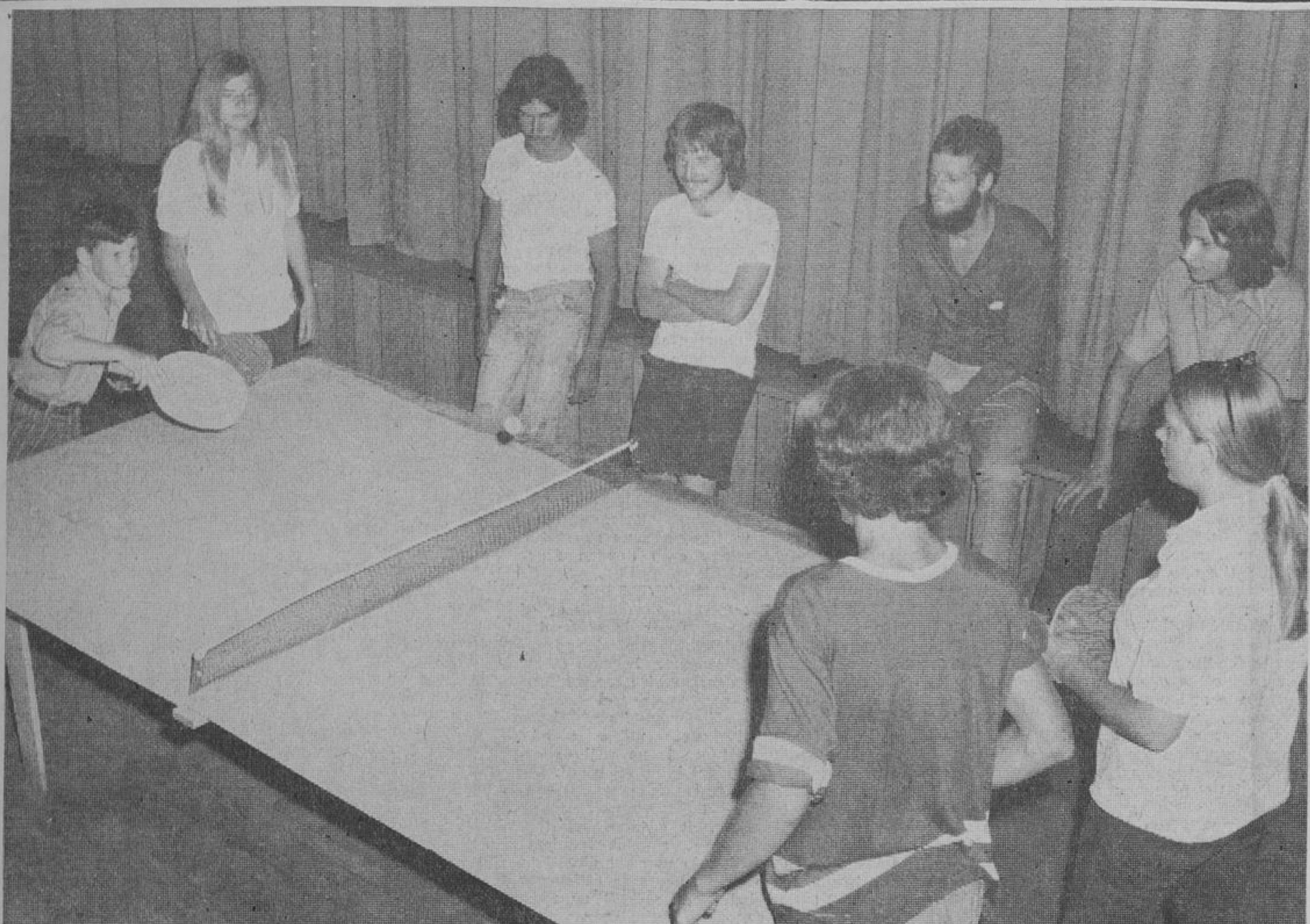

Youth Involvement Centres are being operated this summer by the town recreation department both in the Maple and Woodbridge areas, one at the Woodbridge High School and the other at the Maple Community Centre. At Maple the youngsters were invited to choose their own programs and the facilities were opened from 6:30 pm to midnight

from Monday to Friday, plus some Saturdays when space was available.

Judge Helps Mother Discipline Girl

A disgusted Weston mother heard to say "Anyone who raises teenagers these days has got rocks in their head", was given some of a wayward antagonistic 16-year-old daughter

George Bishop, 52, of 10 Avion Avenue, Toronto, here in provincial court Thursday elected trial by judge without a jury and agreed to waive the right to a preliminary hearing. Provincial Judge Pearce com-

mitted Bishop to trial by judge alone during the next York County Court General Sessions of the Peace. Crown Attorney Kingsley Wijesinha withdrew the additional charge of dangerous driving.

ed trial for stealing a watch left in a Vaughan Town restaurant washroom May 1 by a Downsview man. Kevin Fath, 18, of 14 McDonald Street was convicted and fined \$50 or 30 days in jail while his companion Guy Brown, 19, of 176 Beckwith Street North was found innocent.

The watch owner said he checked the washroom and followed the pair again asking for his watch, but had to call police.

York Regional Police Constable Frank Laskoski testified both youths denied picking up the watch and continued eating hamburgers. YRP Constable Robert Cheevers testified he got the watch from Fath while Laskoski was getting a description of the watch from the owner.

Judge Pearce said the evidence was enough to put the second youth under suspicion, but not sufficient to prove he knew, without a doubt, that his companion committed the theft.

when she appeared in Richmond Hill Provincial Court on Thursday of last week.

The girl was caught drinking underage at an illicit party in Vaughan on her birthday a few days earlier.

Provincial Judge Russell Pearce asked the mother if she needed some help in enforcing house rules like a time to be in at night.

The mother agreed she would appreciate that.

Judge Pearce gave the youngster a suspended sentence for one year and asked her to agree to sign the terms of required behavior, including absolutely no drinking, an 11 pm to 5 am every day curfew except with her mother's permission to stay out, staying away from all places where alcoholic beverages are served or sold and being of good behavior. The judge added that the mother and daughter could apply to him at anytime to have the terms relaxed or stiffened whenever they wished.

The girl demurred a bit over agreeing to the terms, indicating she would sign only because she had no other choice.

"You can stay in custody until you agree to sign. It's about time you started acting like an adult. Don't touch alcohol until you're 18, although it would be just as well or better to stay away from it altogether", said the judge.

The 16-year-old agreed to sign. While she sat in the court and waited for the papers to be prepared, the tears of teenage contrition flowed for a while.

A county court judge probably sometime next year will rule on the criminal negligence automobile charge which grew out of the May 27, Concession 7 road death of Markham cyclist David Peacock, 13, of 79 Sherwood Forest Drive.
