Enumerators To Be Knocking At Doors Sept. 5 For 1972 Municipal Elections

Enumeration of voters for Ontario's first uniform municipal election starts September 5 and will continue until October 10. For the first time this year, almost all Ontario municipalities will vote on the same day — the first Monday in December, and municipal elections will be held every two years in the future.

Both the enumerator and person checked must sign the enumeration notice and the enumerator must leave a duplicate copy at the house. Assessment commissioners will have to supply school boards with complete lists showing school tax support.

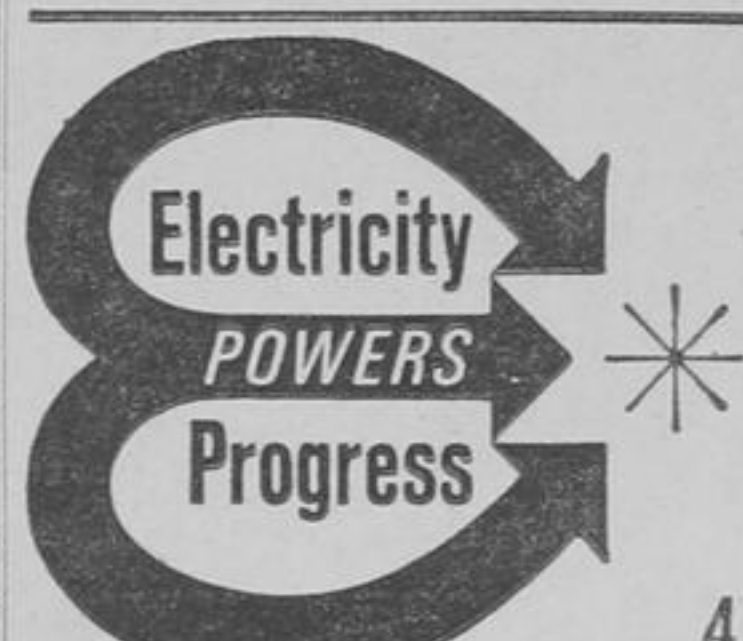
