

Markham To Hire 2 More Planners

Markham Town Planning Committee decided July 20 to add two qualified planners to its planning staff in the near future.

The two will be: a development planner who will be responsible mainly for reviewing subdivision plans, site plans and rezoning requests at a sallary of \$8,500 to \$10,500; and a project planner who will be responsible mainly for carrying out special studies, long-range planning, etc., at a salary of \$8,500 to \$10,500. The salary scale in each case will need approval of the town's personnel committee.

With Planning Director William Powers this will bring the number of planners in Markham to three.




